To be Represented at The Hague Conference.

SECRET SESSIONS

Are Planned, but No Definite Program Has Been Arranged—Will Convene June 15.

The Hague, June 3.—The general plan of the proceedings at the second peace conference probably will follow closely the procedure of the first congress held in 1889. Practically nothing has been worked out in advance. The Dutch government, realizing that the representatives of the 46 powers who will assemble here June 15 must be the complete masters of the situation, has refrained from in any way attempting to control or arrange the program or method of procedure. It simply offers its hospitality to the conference. The same is true of Russia. The czar was the Aladdin who rubbed the lamp and summoned the genii, but once called into being, they are beyond his control.

The arrangements up to the present time, therefore, simply cover the opening session, when Mr. Neidloff, the Russian ambassador to France, will call the conference to order and make an address extending his sovereign's greetings to the delegates. Dr. Van Goudralne, the Dutch minister for foreign affairs, will reply in an address of welcome on behalf of Queen Wilhelmina. Thereafter, it will remain for the conference to decide how it will proceed.

It is safe to assume, however, that the general line of procedure of the former conference will be duplicated. The first thing in order will be the appointment of committees to consider the various subjects inscribed upon the Russian program. These will hardly number more than five. Unless the question of the reduction or limitation of armaments is injected into the proceedings at the outset, in which event the main struggle may be at once precipitated, the plenary body probably will not meet again for ten days or a fortnight, in order that the committees may have an opportunity to prepare reports for submission.

The opening session will be public to the extent of admitting a few distinguished guests and press representatives, but the sessions of the convention and the committees will be strictly secret.

In 1889 Russia attempted to shroud the proceedings in secrecy, but after a fortnight it was found that this course led to the publication of so many mischievous rumors that several semi-official statements were issued. This year many of the delegates, realizing the advantage of stopping the mouths of the sensation mongers, favor the issuance, daily if possible, of a brief semi-official statement. The French language will be the official language of the conference.

It is desired that the laying of the cornerstone of the palace of peace to which Andrew Carnegie has subscribed \$500,000 shall take place before the adjournment of the convention.

The lowest estimate of the duration of the conference is six weeks, and the prevailing belief is that it will be in session between two and three months.

Strikers Revise Their Demands.

New York, June 3.—At a meeting Sunday at which were represented 19 branches of the striking Longshoremen's union, demands made a month ago on the steamship companies were revised. The longshoremen demanded 40 cents for day work and 60 cents for night and Sunday work. Soon after the strike began a compromise was effected with the Savannah and Morgan lines on a basis of 35 cents for day work and 50 cents for night work. At Sunday's meeting it was decided to reduce the demands made on the trans-Atlantic lines to the figure of the compromise with the coast lines.

Disastrous Floods in Texas.

Houston, Tex., June 3.—Unable to stand a 35-foot rise, the banks of the Colorado river have broken at two points and a vast area of rich farming land and one town is under water. The levee protecting the Eldridge plantation gave way and 5,000 acres were inundated. At Wharton the river is out of its banks and has threatened the city water plant, leaving the town without fire protection.

Legislature a Tie on Joint Ballot.

Columbus, O., June 3.—As the result of the four vacancies in the Ohio house of representatives, the legislature is a political tie on joint ballot, if the Toledo independents are counted with the democrats. The republican margin in the house has been reduced from three to one. The death of N. S. Stevens, republican, of Clermont county, Saturday, makes the first break in the membership of the legislature from that cause. An effort may be made to have Gov. Harris call special elections to fill the vacancies in the house.

Puts Old Coins in Circulation.

Pulaski, Tenn., June 3.—Stricken with the fear that he would be murdered for his money Willis Smith, 84 years old, has flooded the county with \$30,000 in quarters and half dollars which he has been hiding in fruit jars for many years. The money was coined two generations ago, but is not worn. Many years ago Smith put some money in a bank and the cashier at once paid it out on a check. Smith saw this and withdrew his money, saying he would not do business with a concern that would not keep his money "better than that."

Four Men Drowned.

New Haven, Conn., June 3.—Edward Auth, of Brooklyn, was brought here last night on the tug Wyoming, the sole survivor of a party of five men, the other four members having been drowned when the sloop Belle, of Brooklyn, capsized Sunday in a heavy sea off Norwalk in Long Island Sound. Auth is at the New Haven hospital in a precarious condition, as a result of hours of buffeting by the waves as he clung to the overturned boat before he was taken off by the Wyoming. The others of the party were Jacob Auth, brother of Edward, August Jaeger, Otto Pfeiffer and George Glazer.
