LAUNCH RUN DOWN BY TUG TOWING A BARGE

Disaster is the Greatest Which has Overtaken the Navy Since the Bennington Disaster—Secretary Metcalf has not Been Heard From but no Alarm is Felt at Washington.

Washington, June 2.—Some light is cast on the loss of a launch of the Minnesota with six midshipmen and five sailors, at Hampton roads, yesterday, by a telegram from Norfolk, stating that the launch on which the men were returning from shore collided with a tug towing a coal barge and the men were caught under the canvas of the launch, which went to the bottom. The identity of the barge is not known, but Admiral Evans is said to be investigating with a view to arrests. He has already convened a court of inquiry.

President and Mrs. Roosevelt today sent a telegram of consolation to Evans to transmit to the fleet.

Washington, June 12.—A story was current here at midnight that the Dolphin, with Secretary Metcalf and a party of friends, is several hours overdue on its return trip from Jamestown. The members of the party are: Secretary and Mrs. Metcalf, Postmaster General and Mrs. Meyer, Mr. and Mrs. George Vanderbilt, Miss Chabote

and Victor Metcalf, son of the secretary. The party left here Saturday to visit the Jamestown exposition and started back to Washington at 8:00 o'clock this morning and was due here at 6 o'clock tonight. At midnight it was impossible to verify the story that the Dolphin had not arrived. At the wireless telegraph station at the navy yard here the operator on duty here said he was not permitted to give out any information.

There have been severe storms on the Potomac river and Chesapeake bay since yesterday. No officials could be reached to confirm the report. If the Dolphin does not reach here by early morning or is not located by wireless telegraph, government tugs will be sent in search of her.

Washington, June 12.—No alarm is felt at the navy department for the safety of Secretary Metcalf, who with a party was aboard the light house tender which left Jamestown yesterday to go up the river to Westover, Virginia, where Postmaster General Meyer took a train. The channel is narrow, necessitating slow travel. The department does not believe there has been a mishap.

JAPAN AND THE UNITED STATES ARE FRIENDLY

OFF FOR OYSTER BAY

Washington, June 12.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt left for Oyster Bay this morning. Several hundred people assembled and cheered them as the train pulled out. At Jersey City the President took a tug for Long Island and will reach Oyster Bay at 5 o'clock. A score of clerks and secretaries accompanied the president. He will not return to Washington until October.

Orchard continued his story today under cross-examination. This is his seventh day on the stand.

PROSECUTION IN THE KAUFFMAN CASE RESTS

Flandreau, South Dakota, June 12.—The prosecution in the case of Mrs. Kauffman, accused of the murder of her domestic, Agnes Polreis, rested this morning and a recess was taken to give the defense time to prepare for the introduction of evidence. Doctors swore that the wound found on the girl's body was sufficient to cause death.

ABE RUEF SAYS HE GAVE SCHMITZ \$2,500

San Francisco, June 12.—Abe Ruef was allowed to testify in the trial of Mayor Schmitz this morning. Ruef swore that he gave the mayor \$2,500 out of the fund gathered from French restaurants, directly contradicting Schmitz's testimony of yesterday.

CARBOLIC ACID

Poured Down a Little Girl's Throat by Her Insane Father.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 12.—Robert Jolley, aged forty, is accused by the police of having murdered his daughter Gladys, aged 9, this morning, by pouring carbolic acid down the child's throat. Anna Peters, a housekeeper called the police and told them that, hearing a scuffling up stairs she rushed up and saw Jolley forcing a bottle into the child's mouth. Jolley was arrested later and is apparently insane.

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 12.—Alleging that his wife held the opinion of experimental marriage, upon which she had acted by leaving him permanently after a year's trial separation, George W. SENATOR MORGAN DIES SUDDENLY

Alabama Statesman, Who for Thirty Years has Been a Familiar Figure in the Upper Halls of Congress Succumbs to an Attack of Angina Pectoris.

Washington, June 12.—United States Senator John Tyler Morgan of Alabama, for thirty years a member of the upper house of congress, chairman of the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals and prominent as a brigadier general in the Confederate army, died at his home at 11:15 last night. Senator Morgan has been in poor health for a number of years, but had more or less regularly attended the sessions of congress. He suffered from angina pectoris, which was the cause of his death. At the deathbed were his daughters, Miss Mary and Miss Cornelia Morgan, both of this city, and his secretary, J. O. Jones.

Mr. Morgan attended to his congressional duties at his home here until about a week ago. Since that time he has been confined to his home and to his bed. He has been able, however, to sit up for a while and talk over some official matters with his secretary. He began falling off during the evening, however, and the physicians were hurriedly summoned.

Mr. Morgan was a democrat and was born in Athens, Tenn., June 20, 1824. His home in Alabama was at Selma, where the funeral will probably take place, the body probably being taken from here Thursday. Mr. Morgan had held a number of important offices beside that of senator, including membership in the Hawaiian laws commission and arbitrator on the Behring sea fisheries. His chief active interest in the senate in recent years had been in connection with the isthmian canal question. He was a persistent advocate of the Nicaraguan route and made a number of speeches during his long but unsuccessful fight for the adoption of a Nicaraguan waterway. In the hearings on the canal question in committee and on the floor, Mr. Morgan took an active part, despite his feeble strength.

Mr. Morgan was a familiar figure in this city, where he made his home for a long time at 315 John Marshall place.

Washington, June 12.—Committees from the senate and house will accompany the remains of the late senator, John T. Morgan, to his old home at Selma, Ala., where they will be interred. Funeral services will be held here, Friday.

KAISER BOXED PRINCE'S EARS

Tore Decorations From Prince Frederick Henry of Prussia, Degrades Him and Orders Him From Germany Because of Extreme Immorality.

Berlin, June 12.—The grand sensation in court circles in years was created by the degrading and ordering out of Germany, of Prince Frederick Henry, of Prussia, by the kaiser, his cousin, because of extreme immorality. When evidence of the Prince's wrong doing was presented, the kaiser summoned his cousin to the palace and there the charges were read. Kaiser William personally tore from his relative the orders and decorations which he wore, boxed his ears and ordered him to leave Germany and never return, under penalty of prison. Frederick Henry is now on his way to Egypt.

FIRE-BUGS BUSY IN TWO OHIO TOWNS

Girard is Almost Entirely Wiped Out and Mineral Ridge has a \$4,000 Fire—Aid Sent by Youngstown Alone Prevented the Total Destruction of Girard.

Girard, Ohio, June 12.—Fire early this morning, caused the destruction of eight business blocks, the M. E. church, two residences and two barns, with a loss of nearly \$200,000. The town has only a bucket brigade and help, sent by the Youngstown fire department alone prevented the total destruction of the business section.

The work is supposed to be that of fire-bugs, and the state fire marshals office will investigate. When the Youngstown firemen arrived, both sides of Liberty street, the chief business thoroughfare was ablaze. The Methodist church destroyed, was the finest structure in Ohio.

At the same time as the fire here, a \$40,000 blaze at Mineral Ridge, near here, occurred and is also supposed to be of incendiary origin. Chief Loller of the Youngstown department was injured.

ORTHODOX JEWS OF CLEVELAND IN RIOT

Because of the High Prices Demanded for Meat, They Attack Patrons of Butcher Shops, Beat Them and Throw Purchases Into the Gutter—Meat Wagons Attacked and Meats Spoiled with Kerosene.

Cleveland, O., June 12.—Serious riots occurred here today, following the decision of orthodox Jews at a mass meeting last night, to eat no more meat, until prices are reduced. Crowds of men and women gathered around the kosher shops and attacked everyone, who made purchases from the butchers. Buyers were beaten and their purchases were thrown into the gutter. Wagons, delivering meat were attacked, the meat spoiled by kerosene and the drivers beaten. The police were called out and partial order has been restored.



THE BRITISH WINSTON CHURCHILL.

Now and then Winston Churchill of America or Winston Churchill of England does something to attract attention. The English Winston Churchill, whose picture is given here, is a young man of many roles. He is half American, and his strenuous character shows it. His mother, before her marriage to the late Lord Randolph Churchill, was Miss Jennie Jerome of New York. Winston Churchill has been a member of parliament since 1900.
