## GREEN CAMP MEN INJURED

During Runaway Sunday Evening.

## VALUABLE HORSE KILLED

Frightened Colt Dashes Into Plate Glass Window.

Throat Cut by Broken Glass—Is Shot to Prevent it From Bleeding to Death.

Two men were injured, a valuable horse was killed, a big plate glass window demolished and a carriage badly damaged in a runaway which occurred in the business section of the city, shortly after 7 o'clock, Sunday evening. The horse which caused all of the excitement was owned by Earnest Anderson, a blacksmith from Green Camp. The animal jumped through a big plate glass window in the front of F. M. Kirby and company's store on West Center street, cutting itself so badly that it was shot afterward to prevent it from bleeding to death.

The men injured were Anderson and W. M. McNeal, the latter a carpenter whose home is in Green Camp. The runaway started on Prospect at the west end of the city building, where Anderson had stopped to water his horse. A passing automobile frightened the animal, a mere colt. Anderson who was holding the horse, was dragged a short distance and was thrown against the curb in front of the city market. A deep gash was cut in his forehead. McNeal, who was sitting in the carriage, jumped and was thrown a considerable distance. His knees were badly injured and his clothes torn.

At Center street, the horse turned east and in front of the Kirby store almost collided with a horse being driven by John Ritzler, of Green Camp. The frightened animal turned and dashed toward the Kirby store, going straight into the entrance. Men who witnessed the accident, say that the animal jumped entirely through the show window. The big window in front was not damaged.

The horse's throat was badly cut and a tendon in one of the rear legs was severed, so that it's hoof hung limp and useless. The injured animal was taken to the alley at the rear of the Kirby store, where a veterinary was called. It was found that nothing could be done to save the colt's life, and an officer was called to put an end to its suffering.

In turning into the Kirby store, the carriage attached to the frightened horse struck John Ritzler's rig and tore off a wheel. Ritzler was not injured.

Contract for New Speed Barn to be Let Saturday.

A meeting of the executive committee of the Marion County Agricultural society was held at the office of the secretary, J. A. Knapp, Saturday, for the purpose of awarding the contract for a new speed barn. The bids, ranging from \$700 to \$1,400, were regarded to high, and all were rejected. New bids will be received this week, and the contract will be awarded at a meeting of the board next Saturday.

## PAVING CONTRACTS FINALLY AWARDED

All Work Must be Completed by Nov. 1.

Uncapher and Scott and P. Drake & Sons Each Given Two Contracts.

The Board of Public Service met Saturday night and for the third time during the week, tried to award contracts for the paving of four streets. The effort was unsuccessful, and another meeting was called for Monday noon, at which time the matter was finally disposed of.

Saturday night petitions were presented, designating just what kind of material the property owners on the respective streets desired used in the contemplated improvements. On the Boulevard, the people wanting the street paved with Logan block and Murphy grout filler, won out. The petitions showed that the Logan people had 2472.5 feet frontage while the Athens people had only 1808.5 feet. Then the contract was awarded to P. Drake and Sons at \$22,803.70, but later it was discovered that the bid of Uncapher and Scott was about \$600 less, so the deal was declared off and another meeting called.

The following contracts were awarded:  
Grand Avenue, to P. Drake and Sons, \$5945.29. Athens block with cement filler will be used. Bond was fixed at \$3,000.  
Cherry street to Uncapher and Scott at \$7477.31. Athens block with cement filler. Bond, \$1,800.  
South Prospect street, P. Drake and Sons, \$19,821.69. Logan block with Murphy grout filler. Bond, \$10,000.  
Monday noon the board again met and awarded the Park Boulevard contract to the firm of Uncapher and Scott at \$20,858.73. The paving is to be of Logan block with Murphy grout filler. Bond was required of \$10,500. All of the construction above named must be completed by November first.

## HUNGARIANS ARE ARRESTED

Have Regular Free-for-all Fight.

## BALL TOSSERS PINCHED

Fined Monday in the Mayor's Court.

Burglars Break Into the Somerlott Grocery—Probably Work of Small Boys.

In a free-for-all fight in the Hungarian boarding house located at the corner of La Tourette and West Center streets, Saturday night, Steve Fargas, and Stif Czech, were severely beaten and injured by Steve Berke and Guisya and Joe Vargo.

The trouble started over a slight misunderstanding. Chairs, tables, and dishes, and every available article figured in the scrap. About forty Hungarians boarded at the place and the only reason that more were not concerned in the battle is that the remainder were not there at the time.

The fighters were arrested by Officer Chapman and taken to the police headquarters which turned into a hospital until the injuries had been dressed. Fargas and Czech filed affidavits against the three men.

After hearing a recital of the case through an interpreter the mayor then fined Berke \$5 and Vargo \$10.
