BOARD IS DETERMINED

Marion to Undergo a General Clean-up.

ORDERS TO BE ISSUED

Business District Out-houses Scheduled to Go.

Board of Public Service Transacts Considerable Important Business at Last Night's Session.

The board of Public Service is determined that a general clean-up of the city, especially in the business districts must be made. Orders to that effect will be issued at once. At last night's meeting of the body "Cleanliness" was the topic discussed. Said one member of the board, "Complaints are entirely too numerous against the nuisance of the out-houses in the business portion of the city. They must go."

Mr. Amos Kling was present, and the board requested that he place sanitary closets in his block on South Main street, occupied by the Busy Bee and Ringer and Jennings. Mr. Kling assured the board that he would be willing to affect the improvement, but could not do it at once, because of the necessity of his being absent from the city for the next two months. He willingly agreed however to rush the work immediately upon his return and the board was satisfied.

Mrs. X. Herman, of North Main street, who had also been ordered to place sanitary closets in her building appeared in person and asked the board that she be allowed some several weeks in which to affect the work, owing to the fact that she would be out of the city for the next few weeks. Her request was granted. The board awarded four sewer contracts. The bidders were H. W. Mann, Joe Murphy and Price and Herman. Murphy was the lowest bidder in every case, and consequently received the four contracts. Murphy's first bid was on a cellar drain for Marshall street, it being \$89. The next bid was for cellar drains for Senate street and was \$358.50. His bid was \$843.46 for cellar drains on Toledo Avenue. For a sewer on Mary street, \$558.52. The contracts were let under the conditions that Toledo Avenue be completed by September 1, Marshall and Senate by August 15 and Mary street by August 1.

The bonds of P. Drake and sons for paving South Prospect street and Grand Avenue were received by the board, accepted and placed on file. Dr. G. T. Harding was present and asked that the board grant him the privilege of laying a sanitary sewer and cellar drain from John street, at his own expense, through the alley along the west side of his property, the work to be done under the supervision of the city engineer. The privilege was granted.

The contract for laying a four foot sidewalk in front of lots No. 1485 1486 and 1487 on Franconia avenue, was awarded to H. W. Mann, who agreed to lay Fulton stone at a cost of 15 1/2 cents per square foot. The work is to be completed by August 1.

Mr. Bain, park superintendent, informed the board of the need of a well in Lincoln park. He said that the neighbors in the vicinity of the park have been complaining of picnickers running across their yards to secure water and that a well is very essential. The board received three bids from various well diggers. The lowest was submitted by T. J. Selders, who agreed to drive the well for 75 cents per foot. However, none of the bidders specified in their bids, the kind of pump, casing, etc., to be used and the board referred the matter to the next meeting, when the contractors will submit new bids.

Bills aggregating \$412.50 were allowed and ordered paid. The Board of Health held a very short session immediately upon the adjournment of the Service board. Health officer Lutz reported three cases of mumps, one of measles and one of whooping cough, existing in the city.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

Miraculous Escape of Henry Bowman

RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS

Remembers Nothing of what Took Place

Investigation Proves That Victim Received Full Force of the Electric Bolt.

Henry Bowman, aged about forty, and residing six miles east of the city on the Patten road, is probably the only man in Marion county who can truthfully relate the story of how he was struck by lightning. And today he bears the marks which prove the incident.

It was Tuesday evening about five o'clock at the time when the heavy rain and thunder storm passed over Marion county. Mr. Bowman was plowing corn in a field near his home when it began to rain. Thinking that the rain would blow over, he took shelter under a tree in the field. Scarcely had he arrived under the tree than there was a terrible crash of thunder. His farm hand was plowing corn in the same field and was half stunned by the shock, but recovered in time to see his employers' horses plunging and kicking.

Hastening to the scene, the hand found Mr. Bowman lying on the ground unconscious. He was taken to the house, nearby, where water was dashed in his face, and he soon recovered consciousness. There were black and blue marks on the lower part of the body, marking where the lightning had struck. The most peculiar part of the accident, however, was that an hour afterwards Mr. Bowman had entirely recovered from the shock and said that he was feeling better than he had for years.

Bowman remembers nothing of the incident. Outside of a turning sensation from the bruises on his body he stated Wednesday that he was feeling no ill effects from his experience. The neighbors, thinking that the lightning had struck the tree and glanced, striking the victim, visited the spot a few hours later. They found the tree to contain no marks whatever, of having been struck, and there were no marks in the earth to signify that the bolt had found a lodging there. There is little doubt but what Bowman was struck fairly by the bolt and miraculously escaped serious injury.
