FANS ARE GETTING EXTREMELY WEARY

Work of Lime Burners a Disappointment.

Patrons of Game Think It's About Time for Locals to Win a Few—Notes.

The Lime Burners are going to lose no matter whether the whole team is in the field or not. In the past two games the players have secured five hits and one run. Unless they get out of that habit of making about a run a week, Mansfield will be rooted out of the last hole in spite of her most earnest efforts to hold the place.

At no time this season has the local club played consistent baseball. About once a month, they knock the cover off the ball and then fall to get more than a hit or two a game for the next couple of weeks. To say that the fans are discouraged is putting it mildly. They have put up with poor baseball, dumb plays, lack of hitting and have said nothing while the regulars were out of the game. But now the regulars are back and what has been the result? The club has lost three and won two. In none of the three games lost has it shown anything like a fighting spirit. When the club is three runs ahead the game is by no means safe, but when the opponents get a lead of three runs the game is hopelessly lost. The Lime Burners do not seem to have the fighting spirit that must be a part of every winning baseball club.

The local fans are not knocking. There are comparatively few knockers in Marion compared with other towns in the circuit. They do want a baseball club that will win a fair percentage of its games, and they are willing to put up the money to get such a club. Only a short time ago it was rumored on the streets that \$300 was wanted for Dithridge's release, by Baltimore. Within 15 minutes the amount was subscribed. If more money is needed more can be had.

On Thursday the Lime Burners will commence a series of twelve games here. The season is well advanced and the distance between the second and first division clubs is growing greater daily. Unless Marion gets a jump and shows class during the long series at home all hopes of the club gaining a berth in the first division will go glimmering.

WANT \$1,000 FOR LOCAL BALL TEAM

Fans Trying to find Way to Get Coin.

Is Probable That Exhibition Game with Big League Team will be Arranged—Meeting Soon.

The movement started by some of the dyed in the wool baseball fans to raise \$1,000 for the benefit of the local team is on in earnest. Those in charge are trying to devise ways of getting the coin.

The directors of the club have not asked for any financial assistance in getting through the season. The club lost a great deal of money during the first six weeks of the season but the club owners did not squeal and have said nothing although the salary list of the club has been increased on account of injuries to a number of the players.

The object of the fans in raising the money is to secure at least one high class pitcher or two if necessary and to strengthen the club in any way that the manager may suggest. Drumm has a first class team this season but by strengthening in the pitcher's box and possibly in one other position he will be able to cop a larger percentage of games.

The leaders in the movement have two plans in view. One is to secure some big league club for an attraction here and sell tickets to the fans at a dollar per, to help along the movement or to collect subscriptions of a dollar from those who desire to give and those who have not subscribed for stock in the company.

It is believed that the former way will be far more satisfactory and that the necessary money can be raised. The movement was inaugurated without the knowledge of the officers of the baseball company.

It is probable that a meeting of the leaders in the movement will be called for some time in the near future, at which time definite arrangements will be made.
