WILL ELECT WHOLE BODY

No Member of Council to Hold Over.

A RULING IS GIVEN

Smith Bennett Remedies the Oversight of Legislature

In Correcting Terms of City Officials General Assembly Makes no Provisions for Councilmen-at-Large

As the result of an opinion rendered Wednesday by Smith W. Bennett, special counsel in the attorney general's office, it is now certain that an entire council will be elected in Marion this fall.

Following is what the Ohio State Journal says about Mr. Bennett's ruling:

"Though no specific provision for it is made in the laws, all members of the city councils will be elected this fall for two-year terms, beginning January 1, 1908. In correcting the terms of municipal officials to comply with the biennial election amendment to the constitution the legislature omitted all reference to councilmen-at-large.

When the municipal code was adopted, city officials were divided into two classes, one class to be elected each year for a two-year term. This was abolished by the legislature at its last session, as far as councilmen for the wards are concerned.

They are now elected each odd year for two-year terms, in accordance with the new constitutional amendment separating city and state elections.

Since the old provision for councilmen-at-large is in conflict with the amended state constitution, and it was the evident intent of the legislature to treat them uniformly with ward representatives, Smith W. Bennett, special counsel in the attorney general's department has held in a letter to the city solicitor of Lancaster that the councilmen-at-large have terms coincident with the ward men.

The new section of the code (117) defining the terms of councilmen, entirely supersedes the one originally in the code under the same number. The effect of this is no longer to provide that municipalities must be re-constituted every ten years, in accordance with the result of the federal census. BIG STORE IN THE WEST END

Denman—Jenner Co. to Take up Immense Floor Space.

MODERN IN EVERY WAY

Will Compare With up-Town Business Places.

First Floor of Denman Block to be Made Into One Big Room—Furniture Firm to Move.

West Marion is soon to have a dry goods store that will compare with any in the city. The Denman-Jenner company, which has its place of business at the corner of Blaine avenue and Center street, is soon to occupy the entire first floor of the Denman block, and as a result the company will have almost as much space as is to be found on the first floor of any up-town store.

The company has conducted an up-to-date store ever since it started in business, and as a result, the patronage has grown to an extent that was not anticipated. The present floor space is inadequate and the proprietors have decided on making extensions.

The firm of Bowman & Schoenberg, which is now conducting a furniture business in the west room of the Denman block will move into the east room of the Hogan block, formerly occupied by the Lust grocery. The work of tearing out the partition between the two rooms in the Denman block will be started at once so that the place will be ready for the dry goods firm before fall. Bowman & Schoenberg will move early in August.

The fact that a store of such size is to be established in the West end is only another indication of the fact that this section of the city has become an entirely distinctive commercial center.

Mrs. Milton Moore Succumbs to Quick Consumption.

Leaves Eight-Months-Old Child in Dying Condition—Mother was Only 25 Years Old.
