BERLIN IS IN TERROR

"Hans the Ripper" Continues Horrible Mutilation of Children

Berlin, July 30.—"Hans the Ripper," as the frightened Berliners call him, is again on his rounds, and Berlin is once more terror-stricken.

Today the fiend killed one little girl mutilated two others and was attempting to kill another child when he was frightened away.

The first act in this recrudescence of the terror was the discovery of the mutilated corpse of a six-year-old girl in the back yard of a house in the northeast part of Berlin.

While the police was searching for the criminal two other cases of mutilation were reported. Late in the afternoon he entered a tenement near the center of the city and seized an eleven-year-old girl, Helen Arend, who was descending the stairway.

As a matter of precaution no children are allowed on the street without escort.

Rumor to That Effect is Afloat.

TWO MILLION DOLLARS

To be Used by Harriman Lines in Advertising.

The Erie Officials Far From Satisfied with Work Done by the Unskilled Machinists.

As the number of local workmen, who claim to be able to do the work of skilled machinists, increase, the fires of indignation, of both contending parties in the Erie machinist's strike, grow hotter.

The mere mention of the strike to officials or laborers arouses the ire of the contending parties. Both parties must concede, apparently and according to recent reports both are willing to do so.

Two million dollars is to be expended by the Harriman lines in the most energetic advertising campaign in their history.

The report that President F. D. Underwood of the Erie railroad will resign shortly has been revived. But this time it is coupled with the statement that he will be succeeded by Samuel Felton, president of the Chicago & Alton.

An engine on the Pennsylvania road was derailed about ten o'clock this morning, in front of the C. & E. eating house. No damage was done.

USED COFFIN TO SLEEP IN

And in His Uncanny Bed He Died—Buried in the Grave He Dug.

Patten, Me., July 30.—Horace Tarbell, a queer old character who lived in a cabin twelve miles west of here, died this week in a coffin he built for himself and was buried, at his request, in a grave he dug and lined with stone more than 20 years ago.

Three years ago, a party of sportsmen, who were storm bound in the woods, took refuge in Tarbell's cabin, where they found the man at work on a long narrow box.

"When I get it done I am going to sleep in it, for as soon as I get the summons, I shall turn over and go to sleep," he said.

When the storms abated Tarbell took his guests to a cleared spot back of his cabin, where he raised a slab and showed them his grave. He went

into great detail as to its construction, particularly the system of blind drainage, by which he kept the water out.

Whether Tarbell had a premonition of death is not known. He was found a day after he had passed away and it is thought he died of heart disease while asleep.

The marker shows that he was born in June, 1845. It is known that the old man slept in the coffin every night, and that he frequently took afternoon naps in his queer resting place.

WEDS AND TELLS ALL

Woman Marries Former Husband, Then Tells Who She Is.

Central City, S. D., July 30.—Mrs. Mary J. Cook has just been married to John S. Dick, a well-to-do Black Hills miner, and immediately after the ceremony confessed to him that she was his former wife, the wife who 20 years before had applied for and obtained a divorce from him in Montana.

Two years ago, Dick met his former wife, then a widow, in Portland, Ore., where they were visiting the exposition. They had not seen each other for 20 years.

The old flame of love was rekindled in her breast and she set out to win back the husband she had 20 years before divorced. Not letting him know who she was she accomplished her purpose, and when they were united in wedlock she told him her secret.
