SANDSTONE SIDE WALKS

Holds Short Session Tuesday Evening.

PUBLIC SERVICE BOARD

To be Laid on Various Streets.

Bids for the Contemplated Improvements will be Received Tuesday September 3.

The board of public service at its regular meeting last night authorized the clerk to advertise for bids calling for the construction of several miles of sandstone sidewalk on various streets of the city. The bids will be received until 12 o'clock noon, Tuesday, September 3.

The bids will be placed for the paving of sidewalks on the following streets: Farming street on the north side from Greenwood to Jefferson street, Niles street, west side Silver to Keaton Avenue; Seffner Avenue, west side, from Center to Big Four railroad; Medlam, east side from Garfield to Big Four railroad; Garfield, south side from Lincoln to Barnhart; Summit, west side from Church to end of plank walk; Cayboga, east side from Center to Hoyle; Garden City Pike, south side from Main to Oak; Prospect, east side from present terminus to north line of park entrance.

On a motion of Mr. Waples, the board voted to order a sandstone sidewalk on the south side of Mt. Vernon Avenue from Grand Avenue, east to Reid Avenue.

The board voted to provide a sanitary sewer on Mound street to connect with the storm water sewer, the cost of same to be assessed against the abutting property. Bills aggregating \$385.34 were allowed after which the board adjourned.

HEALTH BOARD.

At the meeting of the health board, James Lutz, health officer, submitted his regular report disclosing that there are two cases of typhoid fever and one of chicken pox in the city. He also called the board's attention to a number of minor questions pertaining to the good health of the community.

William and Daniel Murphy both were present and explained to the board why they had not abated certain nuisances on their properties on West Center street. They assured the board that if it would give them several days' extension of time they would place sanitary closets in their buildings and remove the old out-houses. The board accepted their explanation and on the strength of the promise voted to extend the time.

MARION DAY AT JAMESTOWN

Exposition Officials Honor Our City.

MAYOR LOUIS SCHERFF

Is Requested to Issue a Proclamation.

An Elaborate Program Already Arranged for Marion Day During Ohio Week.

Mr. W. F. Thomas, special commissioner of the Jamestown exposition, was in the city today with a formal invitation from the exposition officials to Mayor Scherff, requesting him to issue a proclamation to the citizens of Marion to participate in the celebration of "Marion Day," same to be designated by the mayor and to be one of the six days of Ohio week, which occurs September 9th-14th.

This is quite an honor to Marion and the invitation is the result of the efforts of Mr. Fred Crow formerly of this city, and now prominently connected with the publicity department of the Jamestown exposition.

Mr. Crow was anxious to pay a compliment to his home town and insisted that Marion be given an opportunity to display its progress and attractiveness to the world.

An elaborate program has been arranged in honor of the occasion, prominent among the big events being Illumination of Battleships, Naval Review, Carnival of three branches of military now encamped there, a pageant of all nations, flight of an air ship carrying a sixty foot banner inscribed thereon "Marion Day", a mass band concert by four famous bands, including the Mexican National Band which has been loaned for the Exposition period by President Diaz. A reception in Ohio building by Governor Harris and staff, Dress parade by Ohio National Guard and Daylight fireworks by Palm, concluding at night with a gorgeous display of set pieces, among which will be a portrait of Mayor Scherff.

Mr. Thomas states, the exposition is now entirely completed and well worthy of the attendance of everyone. While it is not on so large a scale as the St. Louis & Chicago fairs, it has many charms and attractive features that the others did not and could not have. The half million dollar government pier running half a mile into the historic Hampton Roads is in itself worth a trip across the continent. The hotel rates are very reasonable and railway rates are much lower than any other exposition ever enjoyed. The deep sea bathing is now at its best and numerous resorts adjoin the exposition grounds.

Mayor Scherff will announce in a few days additional features of the program which will be of much interest to local people.

GORN FESTIVAL DATE IS CHANGED

Takes Place at Garfield Park August 20.

Outing Promises to be One of the Most Unique Ever Held in Marion.

The date for the "Corn Festival" to be given by Marion Lodge, No. 32 B. O. Elks, has been changed to Tuesday, August 20, and the place selected is Garfield park instead of Lincoln park, as was announced last week.

The committee in charge is now hard at work completing the various details and is making arrangements to entertain 300 people. The festival will easily be one of the most elaborate and at the same time most unique outings ever held in the city. The lodge is to spare no expense in making the affair a complete success.

The afternoon will be taken up with different amusements, the principal feature planned being a baseball game between the married and single men. After that will come the feast of corn, prepared in a big pit by "Candy John" McClelland. The corn will be prepared in every infatigable style. Sweet potatoes will be one of the side dishes. It is expected that 75 bushels of corn will be used.

The park will present the appearance of a typical fair. There will be booths and refreshment stands and numerous places of amusement. The Peoples' and will render a concert during the evening.

Results in the Death of William Trout.

GERMAN MISSIONARY DRAWS BIG CROWDS

Will Tell of the Golden City Tonight.

Offers to Furnish Proof of His Teachings—Will Answer all Questions.

Tonight on the courthouse square, L. Schmidt, the German missionary, who is preaching nightly to large crowds, will preach on his remarkable belief regarding what is to come beyond this life. Mr. Schmidt says that he will prove that after death we will stay in the Golden City, or the New Jerusalem, for 1,000 years and that at the end of that period we will return to this earth, made new, to spend eternity.

Not only will the missionary furnish proof for all that, but he will tell us what we are going to eat in the city beyond the clouds. He will use the scripture found in the Twenty-first chapter of Revelations as his text.

Mr. Schmidt says that tonight he will answer all questions put to him and will give souvenir books to those who attend his service.

Tuesday evening, Mr. Schmidt spoke to large crowds on the texts taken from Revelation 14:6-10 and Exodus 20:8-11. His remarks in part were as follows:

"I am not here to argue or to dispute the Sabbath question, but to preach the Gospel, the Bible, the word of God, according to Matthew 10:7-12. "God says in Revelation, 14th chapter, that we should fear Him and give glory to Him, and keep His commandments. Concerning the Sabbath day He says in Exodus 20:8-11, 'Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.' He tells us that the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord. It is not your day or my day; it is His day, and He says, keep it holy."

"Every dictionary tells us that Saturday is the seventh day, and calendars and books give us the same information. These things are facts, stubborn facts."

Mr. Schmidt went on to say that God tells us to keep the seventh day and that since he tells us this, we should not observe the first day, known as Sunday. There is not a word in the Bible about keeping Sunday.

"The Lord gave us the Bible that we might know what to do and what not to do," said Mr. Schmidt.

WILLIAM KANNEL PLEADED GUILTY

Failed to Provide for Little Babies.

Wife Says That William Has Scarcely Worked a Day Since Their Marriage.

William Kannel, of Agosta, was arrested by Humane Officer Clark in that town Tuesday on an affidavit sworn out in Justice R. E. Prettyman's court, charging him with failure to provide for two minor children.

The case was given a hearing in Prettyman's court. At the trial it was disclosed that Kannel had not been troubled with poor health, but simply was too lazy to work. He was married about two years ago and one year of that time he lived with his father-in-law. His wife claimed that he had scarcely worked a day since their marriage. One of the children abandoned by the father is but ten days old, while the oldest is but little over one year of age.

Kannel pleaded guilty to the charge whereupon Justice Prettyman imposed upon him the costs of the trial and made him promise to pay \$8 a month for the support of his children. James H. Eymon, of the city acted as attorney for the prosecution.

MILITARY ORGANIZATION

May be Formed in the City.

COLONEL C. S. AMMEL

Visits Marion for That Purpose Tuesday.

Efforts Being Made to Replace Company D in the Ohio National Guard.

For the purpose of seeing whether there is any possibility of organizing a company of militia to replace D company, which was disbanded several months ago, Colonel C. S. Ammel of the 4th O. N. G. visited the city Tuesday night and met with the directors of the Commercial club. To these officials the colonel explained the reasons for the disbandment of the old company and outlined the conditions under which the new one will be formed.

There were numerous unfavorable circumstances which brought about the disruption of D company according to the information given out by Colonel Ammel. In the first place there was dissension and misconduct among the members and officers of the company. Inefficiency was plentiful and the company had not been on a sound footing for years. Another reason and an important one, for the failure of D company, was the neglect or refusal of the business men of the city to give it either moral or financial support. The business men would not support the command in any way and the manufacturing companies of the city made it impossible for their employees to be members.

If favorable conditions for the organization of a new company can be secured, Colonel Ammel says that he will have one recruited. T. E. Andrews, formerly captain of the old G company of the 14th O. N. G., and recognized as one of the best military leaders in this part of the state, has consented to assume command of the new company if it is formed under the proper conditions.

The club director seemed to take the idea of a new company favorably and Colonel Ammel felt greatly encouraged as a result of the conference. There is a strong probability that a new company will be organized.

An interesting and unusual feature in connection with the conference was the meeting of Colonel Ammel with Frank R. Saiter, one of the club directors. It developed during the conversation that in the Civil War these two men had met in a number of engagements. Ammel was in the 5th Maryland and Saiter in K company of the 4th O. N. G. These regiments met in several several times while campaigning in Virginia.
