UNCLE SAM LOANS HIS SOLDIERS TO JOHN ROBINSON

PINE SALVE ACTS LIKE A POULTICE

ELDER C. A. IRWIN TELLS OF TRIP AROUND WORLD

Address Proves to be One of the Most Interesting and Instructive Delivered at the State Camp Meeting—Elder Allen Moon, President of the Lake Union Conference Speaks Tuesday Evening to a Large Congregation.

Elder G. A. Irwin occupied the three o'clock hour at the camp Tuesday afternoon in a talk regarding his recent trip around the world. Taking passage at San Francisco the 16th of October, he left the United States for Australia, where he spent two weeks visiting the Adventist institutions in that field.

The speaker stated that the work of the seventh-day Adventists in Australia had only been in progress twenty years, but in that time over four thousand believers had been brought to the faith, and that there were six organized conferences in Australia, one in Tasmania and one in New Zealand, and that the whole had been organized into a union conference. This union conference has control of the work of the denomination in the Polynesian, Melanesian and Micronesian groups in the southern Pacific, as well as the work in the East Indies, the Philippine Islands, and the Malay Peninsula. He said that at a recent session of the Union conference held near Sydney, Australia, that fourteen new missionaries were sent out to various places in the missionary territory of the conference, a large proportion of these workers going to the East Indies.

The speaker said that the denomination had a large industrial school in Australia, to which was attached a farm of over one thousand acres. At the present there are two hundred and eleven students in this school, eighty per cent of whom paid a portion of their way by working at the various industries connected with the school, such as printing, carpenter work, sewing, besides the work of the farm. He spoke of their large sanitarium that was in operation near Sydney, and which was exercising a good influence throughout the entire country. He said further that they had a publishing house near Melbourne that employed nearly one hundred hands, who were engaged in printing and publishing nothing but matter bearing upon the third angel's message.

From Australia Elder Irwin went to Cape Town, South Africa, arriving there the first of January and spending the entire month there in a conference which was held in Claremont, one of the suburbs of the city. At this meeting there were representatives from the two organized conferences in the field, viz., Cape Colony and the Natal Transvaal Conference, as well as a representative from each of the nine missions carried on by the denomination among the natives of South Africa.

The speaker called attention to the fact that two years prior to the beginning of our work in South Africa, 1887, that the great continent was in one year divided among eight of the principal nations of Europe, viz., Great Britain, France, Germany, Portugal, Spain, Belgium, Italy and Turkey. Of the eleven and a half millions of square miles contained in the continent all but one million being in the hands of the original owners. He said furthermore that in the last score of years rapid advancement had been made in opening up the country as the result of this foreign occupation. At present there are over eight thousand miles of railroad, railroads having been pushed into the country from eight to ten different points on the east coast, most of them coming far enough into the interior to connect with the Cape Cairo railroad that is projected from Cape Town in the south to Cairo in the north. This railroad is finished from Cape Town almost to the border of the Congo Free State; so that missionaries going up into the interior are no longer compelled to submit to the inconvenience and danger of trekking that long distance with oxen or donkey teams. The trip from the coast to the great lakes, that once occupied seventy days hard and fatiguing march can now be taken in comfortable railway carriages in two days.

The speaker gave as his opinion that while these enterprises were projected and carried forward by European capital for the purpose of obtaining the mineral wealth of the country, there was a greater power and deeper purpose behind it all, and that is, that the time had come for the best messengers of heaven to go to this dark continent, and that the Lord was opening up the way through these agencies so

'There is another scripture that is very similar to this and yet adds another thought, Deut. 4:2, 'Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish ought from it, that ye may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you.' It is commanded that we are neither to add to nor diminish ought from the word of the Lord in order that we may truly keep the commandment of God. In Joshua 1:7, we have promised some of the results of thus keeping the word of God. 'Only be thou strong and very courageous, that thou mayest observe to do according to all the law (which Moses my servant commanded thee; turn not from it to the right hand or to the left, that thou mayest prosper wheresoever thou goest. This book of the law shall not depart; but thou shalt meditate therein day and night, that thou mayest observe to do according to all that is written therein; for then shalt thou make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success.' This certainly is a very excellent recipe for prosperity and success, in life.

'In Deut. 17:18 we have very forceful language as to man's duty with reference to the word of God. God, anticipating that Israel would demand a king that they might be like the nations around them, notwithstanding the fact that he had chosen to place judges over them who should teach them the word of God, says, 'And it shall be when he sitteth upon the throne of his kingdom that he shall write him a copy of this law in a book out of that which is before the priests the Levites, and it shall be with him, and he shall read therein all the days of his life; that he may learn to fear the Lord his God, to keep all the words of this law and these statutes to do them; that his heart be not lifted up above his brethren, and that he turn not aside from the commandment to the right hand, or to the left; to the end that he may prolong his days in his kingdom, he and his children in the midst of Israel.' It was not sufficient that the king should read the word of God occasionally, but the Lord commanded that he should read therein all the days of his life. It was offensive to God that Israel demanded a king; but if the king would follow God's instruction, God would still be king in Israel, for His word would be the rule of the life of the king, and if the king was faithful in the teaching of the word to his people it would be the rule in the life of the people as well.

'Saul was the first king of Israel. Shortly after he came to the kingdom the Lord commanded him to assemble the armies of Israel and go to the land of the Amelkites, and to destroy the Amelkites, man and beast. But Saul diminished from the word of the Lord, and brought back the best of the sheep and the oxen, and then he proposed to offer them as a great sacrifice to the Lord. It was right to offer sacrifices in those days; but the sheep and oxen of Israel had been dedicated to the Lord, while those of the Amelkites had been dedicated to the gods of Amelk, and to offer them in sacrifice to God would be an insult to Deity. Saul had diminished from the word of the Lord in bringing back from the battle that which the Lord had commanded him to destroy, and in an attempt to cover his sin he added to the word of the Lord in sacrificing unto Him that which was not required.

'History is full of illustrations of the results of the violation of the grand principles stated in the Bible. Coming down to New Testament times, we find that Jesus, the Son of God, lived a life of perfect conformity to the word of God, and commanded His disciples to do the same. In reference to the importance of the Sabbath, the Saviour commanded them to pray that their flight from the besieged city of Jerusalem forty years in the future, should not be on the Sabbath day. And history records that the prayers of the disciples were answered but the time came when there was a falling away, according to Paul in 2 Thess. 2:3 The church began first

to disregard the Sabbath commandment and to reverence the first day of the week. Here we find the same principle involved as in the case of Saul. The church failed to observe the word of God, and as a result darkness entered and men could not discern between the sacred and the profane, and so the first day of the week began to be offered to the Lord instead of the day that he had blessed and sanctified. The very name given to the first day of the week, Sunday, indicates its character; it has been dedicated to the sun of the pagans of all nations, thus it is an offense unto God.'

BROTHERHOOD OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Meets Last Night and Perfects Organization.

Chairman of Committees Appointed—Constitution and By-Laws Adopted.

The members of the brotherhood of the Presbyterian church held an important meeting in the church parlors last evening. The business was taken up where it was left off at the initial meeting two weeks ago and the final and definite plans of organization were perfected.

Chairmen of the various committees were appointed at this time: D. C. Nelson was appointed chairman of the inside work committee; W. C. Torrens, chairman of membership committee; Rev. Mr. Bates chairman of outside work committee and C. N. Hillips, chairman of the finance committee.

Arrangements were made for holding a social convale at the church on Tuesday evening, September 10. After discussing various plans which would tend to strengthen the organization, a constitution and by-laws were adopted.

The purpose of the organization is to promote spiritual development, fraternal relations, denominational fealty, the strengthening of fellowship, missionary activity, and the engagement in works of Christian usefulness on the part of the men of the congregation.

Meetings will be held on the second Tuesday of each month.

The executive committee will have general oversight of the work, shall consider all important items of business, and if deemed necessary, bring them before the Brotherhood for final action.

The Membership Committee will seek out and recommend proper persons for membership in the Brotherhood and to encourage the fidelity and usefulness of all the members.

TUESDAY EVENING.

The large tent was crowded last night at which time Elder Allen Moon president of the Lake Union conference delivered a powerful address.

In part he spoke as follows:

'The subject assigned me is "The Greatest Thing in the World." From Isa. 55:10, 11 we learn that, "As the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven, and watereth the earth and maketh it bring forth and bud that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: if we can understand the miracle of life in the vegetable kingdom, then perhaps we can understand something of the power of God's word. By the sending of the rain and the snow and the sunshine upon the dead earth, God causes life to be brought out of death in order to sustain the life of the human family. This was taken to illustrate the power of God's word. Man is said to be dead in trespasses and sin. God has sent His word into the world, and if it is received by men by faith, and becomes the ruling principle of his life, the result is life and power and fruit; thus bringing life from death. This is brief is God's own estimate of His word.

'We have a further statement in the 30th chapter of Proverbs which will help us to understand God's purpose in giving His word to mankind. From the 5th and 6th verses we read, "Every word of God is pure; He is a shield to them that put their trust in Him." That is to say God has never uttered any superfluous words; He has given to mankind just that which is essential to his salvation, no more and no less. The 6th verse

reads, 'Add thou not unto His words, lest He reprove thee, and thou be found a liar.' In the service of God, it is just as offensive for mankind to offer unto Him that which he has not required as to neglect those things which are required in His word.
