

Railroad Notes

Today marked a mile post in the advancement of the Erie railroad in this state, the last stretch of track between Marion and Summit being completed making the road between these two points completely double tracked.

The unfinished track had been under consideration by the road officials for some time and when the order was once given all records were broken in constructing the new line. The section of the road extending from Condon to Ontario, although three and a half miles in length was completed in twenty-four days.

According to the Galton Inquirer, Superintendent H. O. Dunkle and Engineer J. Burke were passing east of that city, when Mr. Dunkle made mention of the advantage to the road if a line should be constructed between Condon and Ontario. Mr. Burke thought that as the officials had been considering the work it could be done easily in thirty days.

A car of Erie machinists passed through the city, Thursday evening. The machinists came from Galton and are today doing service on various points of the road.

The Erie road paid its employees in this city Thursday.

The Big Four pay car will probably reach Marion tomorrow.

An important conference is called. New York, Aug. 5.—Important questions affecting the relations between state and national governments and corporations now so prominently before the public in connection with the fine of \$29,249,000 imposed upon the Standard Oil Company of Indiana by Judge Landis and the conflict between state authorities and the federal judiciary in the railroad cases in North Carolina, will be discussed at a national conference on combinations and trusts to be held in Chicago on October 22, 23, 24 and 25. BURGLARS VISIT FATZLER HOME

Steal One Hundred Jars of Canned Fruit.

Robbers Must Have Used a Horse and Wagon to Carry Away the Sweet Goods.

Burglars with a propensity for sweet things visited the home of Fred Fatzler, on Gurley avenue Wednesday evening, and carried away 100 jars of choice canned fruit. They entered the basement of the home and made a complete raid on its contents. Nothing in the upper part of the house was molested.

Mrs. Fatzler, who reported the burglary to the police Thursday, said she thinks the thieves visited her home while she and her husband were up-town, early Wednesday evening. It is thought that a horse and wagon were used to carry away the fruit.
