

## ADVERTISERS TALK POLITICS

### Candidates for the Presidency are Active and a Fight is on.

Cincinnati, Aug. 28.—Much of the time of the delegates to the convention of the Association of Advertising clubs of America is being devoted to politics. The battle of the cities for the next convention and the next president was resumed early this morning and continued until the president's gavel fell. The Chicago delegates are working hard for the election of E. E. Gibbs, of that city, for president and Milton Bucklin, vice president of the Chicago Press club for secretary. They agree to cast their votes for the next convention to the city which will give them sufficient votes to elect Gibbs and Bucklin, Smith B. Quail, of Cincinnati, is one of the most active candidates for the presidency.

Kansas City still appears to have the lead for the convention next year.

The principal speakers Wednesday were Gerald B. Wadsworth, of New York, whose topic was "Scope, Aims and Purposes of the Association of Advertising Clubs of America" and Medill McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune who spoke on "Character in Advertising."

Wadsworth advocated a reorganization of the association.

A resolution in favor of clean and honest advertising was introduced by President Aulbach, of St. Louis.

The afternoon program includes a trip to the plant of the United States Playing Card company, and a visit to the zoo in the evening.

## GREEN CAMP LINE NEARING COMPLETION

Cars Will Be Running by Fair Time.

C. D. & M. Officials Announce Schedule for the State and County Fair.

Work on the Green Camp branch of the C. D. & M. electric railway is progressing nicely and officials of the company say that cars will be running daily over the branch in time to accommodate the hundreds who will come from that section of the county to attend the county fair.

Although the track is completed only from Owens to the Scioto river, special service is to be given over the branch line on September 3, 5, the two big days of the state fair. One of the local city cars will be sent to the branch line by Superintendent Ammann and will be running the two days so as to connect with C. D. & M. cars going to Columbus. On the days mentioned the car will leave the west end of the branch at 6:30 a. m. and will make a second trip at 9:30 a. m. Both times it will make direct connections with the C. D. & M. Returning in the evening the car will leave Owens at 6 p. m. and at 9:45 p. m. A fare of 10 cents will be charged for an adult and five cents for a child.

A force of men is now at work building a bridge over the Scioto river and as soon as this bridge is finished the track will be laid through to Green Camp. Regular service will be given from Owens to Green Camp all winter.
