MAC BARCUS UNDER ARREST

Steeple Jack Wanted at Columbus.

SOME SERIOUS CHARGES

Will be Placed Against Marion Man.

Police Recover Stolen Bicycle—Strenuous Effort Being Made to Catch Thieves.

Mac Barcus, the daring steeple climber and flag pole painter, who makes this city his headquarters, was arrested here yesterday afternoon and was taken to Columbus this morning for cutting and carrying away large quantities of wire belonging to the various telephone and cable companies of that city.

John J. Mahoney, the noted detective, came up from Columbus this morning and took charge of Barcus. Mahoney has been working on the case for about a month. A wire thief was causing the various companies great annoyance and loss by cutting hundreds of dollars worth of their wires from the poles.

When arrested, Barcus was at work on the top of a pole near the Citizens telephone exchange. He denied any knowledge of the wire thefts.

Only a short time ago, Barcus was here and painted the Huber building flag pole, rather a hazardous feat. His mother resides on North Main street.

Officer Stenge located the bicycle belonging to C. L. Murphy, which was stolen from the Landon store the other night, hidden near a residence on Edwards street and the police believe that they will be able to get to the bottom of the bicycle thieving that has been going on for the past two weeks.

During the past ten days one and sometimes two wheels have disappeared daily and the police have been on the jump trying to locate the guilty parties. The police learned that the first night that Murphy's wheel was stolen it was hidden under the Erie freight house and another night in a corn field.

It is hoped that a thorough sweating of those arrested will bring out a confession that will enable the officers to get other property that has been taken lately.

For causing a disturbance on North Main street last night, Fay Fields was arrested by Officers Hostetter and Wilchim. Fields was mixed up with a large gang of youngsters and when the officers started for the city prison with him the gang became quite noisy and threatened to assault the officers if they did not release the prisoner. Fields was held until this morning when he was lectured by the mayor and then released.

FORCED TO LEAVE

Postal Manager Driven From Office and Furniture Demolished.

Chicago, Aug. 29.—Attacked by a mob of sympathizers of the striking telegraphers, John Laux, manager of the Postal telegraph office at Waukegan, Ill., was forced to flee from his office to escape injury.

Laux who is the sole support of his mother, refused to quit work when the strike was called. A committee of strikers from Chicago went to Waukegan and urged Laux to join them but he refused. Today the strikers and their friends took an excursion steamer ride to Waukegan and, during the day, a score of the excursionists called at the office and became so boisterous he-loyal to his employers that he became frightened and fled.

The intruders then ransacked the office, overturning tables and desks and destroying blanks, books and other stationary. The mob then completed their visit by nailing a big sign labeled "scab" over the door of the telegraph office.

Do Not Fear the State Association.

MARION COUNTY DEAL

The Result of a Sale Pure and Simple.

Local Telephone Men Say That There Has Been no Violation of the Anti-Trust Laws.

That the Ohio Independent Telephone association intends to bring suit to prevent a consummation of the deal between the Marion County and Bell Telephone companies is now a certainty.

In the meantime the officials of the two companies are quietly at work getting ready to put the new telephone system in operation. It is the plan to abolish the local Bell exchange and to connect all telephones to the Marion county exchange next week.

Officials of both the Bell and Marion county companies firmly aver that the deal here is in no way a violation of the anti-trust law. It is purely a legitimate case of buy and sell they state.

The state association has its doubts despite the assertions of the company officials. They believe the deal should be stomped.

Mr. Beam, president of the association left some time ago for a vacation in Denver and vicinity. According to press accounts from Columbus the suit will be started immediately upon his return home.
