CORONER BRADY REPORTS FINDINGS

Regarding Sudden Deaths Occuring Recently

Rulings in Four Important Cases are Filed with County Clerk Tuesday.

Coroner E. L. Brady filed with the county clerk, Tuesday, reports of his findings in regard to four deaths, which occurred during the past few weeks. He reports that August 5 Peter Johnson died of heart failure due to excitement. Johnson is the aged man who became engaged in an altercation with an acquaintance at Prospect and was struck with a cane. He died shortly afterward.

Annie Annett, the aged man who died in an ambulance while being taken to the infirmary, September 14, came to his death through heart failure and old age. Genevieve B. Lee, aged 11 months, died September 23 of mal-assimilation and inanition. This child is the one who came to her death while her father was in the city prison. George Carhart came to his death September 24 by being struck by westbound Erie train No. 77 at the Madison avenue crossing.

PARK RULES ARE ORDERED

By the Board of Public Service.

WITHOUT GREAT EXPENSE

Skating Ponds Can be Built at Each Park.

P. Drake and Sons are Awarded Contract for Widening South Prospect Street.

A number of matters of comparatively small import were given consideration at a rather lengthy session of the Board of Public Service last night. All of the members were present except Mr. Waples.

At the last meeting of the council it was ordered that the board should provide places for skating at each of the city parks so that the youths of the city will be able to enjoy the popular winter pastime as never before. The question was discussed at some length. At McKinley park when the lake is completed there will be a fine place for skating without making any material changes in the present plans. At the north end park the construction of a small dam and retaining wall will spread the water over about four acres of ground and make an excellent skating pond. It is also possible to provide a large place for skating at the east end park by constructing a small embankment and flooding the ground with water from the city hydrants located at the edge of the park.

It was decided to let the question rest for the present but the board will take it up at a later date and here will be fine skating this winter at all of the parks.

Superintendent R. A. Burnett, of the disposal plant reported an exceptionally heavy month's business and that everything at the plant is in excellent condition.

In his report Superintendent Bain stated that the park work is progressing nicely. The city have more employed at this time than at any time in the past. Excellent progress is being made with the pavilion at Lincoln park and with the lake and the stone bridge at McKinley park.

A resolution providing for a contract with P. Drake and Sons to construct the south Prospect street pavement with a width of thirty feet instead of twenty-five was passed.

The street superintendent was instructed to build a cross walk on Superior street at the first alley south of Walnut street and to clean out the ditches on East Mark and East Farming streets.

It was reported that the Barnhart sewer is unable to carry away the surface water along that street since it was tapped by Eli Bush and others who have run a line of eight inch tile 966 feet from across Chicago avenue and emptying into the Barnhart street sewer.

It is thought that Mr. Bush tapped the sewer without the proper permission in which event he will be required to find another outlet.

The city engineer was instructed to investigate and to report at the next meeting of the board.

Residents of Windsor street complained that the Electric Light company has a large number of poles on Windsor street that are not in use and they desire them taken off their properties. The board ordered the street superintendent to see that the poles are taken down if they are not to be used by the company.

G. W. Robertson, the inspector of the Girard avenue paving, certified to the board that the work has been properly done by the contractors. The report was accepted and the street formally taken over by the city. It will be open for traffic on Saturday morning.

Park Superintendent Bain was instructed to prepare a set of rules for the city parks and to present them at the next meeting of the board. After allowing bills amounting to \$6,778.72 the board adjourned.

Health Officer James Lutz reported at the meeting of the Health Board that the following cases have been reported to him during the month: typhoid fever, 14; mumps, 2; whooping cough, 2; tuberculosis, 1; death, 1; scarlet fever, 1; spinal meningitis, 1; deaths, 1; houses disinfected, 2; vaults ordered cleaned, 36; vaults cleaned, 32; dead dogs, 3.
