ORDINANCE NO. 91. To levy special assessments Girard avenue paving and taps.

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio:

Sec. 1. That a special assessment be levied against the lots and lands abutting on both sides of Girard Avenue from Columbia street to Bellefontaine avenue to pay the cost and expense of constructing a brick block pavement on said street between the points aforesaid in the sum of Two dollars and seventy-nine (2.79) cents per lineal foot.

Sec. 2. REED AVENUE.

Sec. 1. That a special assessment be levied against the lots and lands abutting upon the East side of Reed Avenue in front of lots No. 2827 and 2822, to pay the cost and expense of constructing sandstone sidewalks along said street in the sum of Sixty-six (66) cents per lineal foot.

ORDINANCE NO. 92. To provide for the issuing of bonds to pay the part of the cost and expense of paving Mary street, Elm street and George street, McWilliams Court, alleys hereinafter described and for constructing sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Belleview street, alleys hereinafter described, Haine avenue, Avondale, Herr and Superior streets, chargeable by law against the City of Marion, Ohio.

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio:

Sec. 1. That to raise money to pay the part of the cost and expense of the various improvements herein-after described for which said improvements special assessments may be levied chargeable by law against the City of Marion, Ohio, shall be issued and sold in the following amounts. To pay City's portion of the paving of Mary street from Silver to Joseph street the sum of \$500.00; Elm street from Church to Mt. Vernon avenue the sum of \$500.00; George street from Main to Prospect street the sum of \$300.00; McWilliams Court from Center street to the north end thereof the sum of \$150.00; Mill Street from State street to the first alley east of State street and running parallel therewith, also, the first alley east of State street and running parallel therewith from Mill street to Center street, the two alleys running east and west from State street to the first alley east of State street and two alleys east of State street and two alleys west of State street and running parallel therewith, the sum of \$400.00 and for constructing sanitary sewer and cellar drain on Belleview street from the first alley east of State street to Biallentine Avenue the sum of \$500.00; Prospect and Oak street from N. Y. R. and O. R. to the alley south of Silver street; thence east to George street; the sum of \$250.00; Haine avenue from Church street to Mt. Vernon Avenue the sum of \$250.00; Avondale street from Silver street to Blake Avenue the sum of \$300.00; Herr street from Silver street south to Edwards street the sum of \$250.00; Superior street from Prospect street to Irey Avenue the sum of \$100.00.

In the aggregate the sum of Three Thousand and Fifty (3050) Dollars. All of said improvements being declared to be necessary for the health convenience and public welfare.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be issued under authority of an act of the

general assembly of Ohio entitled "An act to amend sections 2835, 2836 and 2837 and to repeal section 2837 A of the Revised Statutes authorizing the issue of bonds by cities, villages, hamlets and townships," passed April 29, 1902 (95 Ohio laws, page 318 to 323) and all amendments there to including the amendments, passed by the General Assembly of Ohio April 22, 23 and 25, 1904, (97 Ohio Laws, page 291, 190 and 520 respectively) and March 22, 1906, (98 Ohio Laws page 63 to 67 respectively). They shall bear date not later than the 1st day of December, 1907, and be due and payable as follows:

One March 1, 1909.
One March 1, 1910.
One March 1, 1911.
One September 1, 1909.
One September 1, 1910.
One September 1, 1911.
One September 1, 1912.

They shall be of the denomination of Five Hundred Dollars each except last one which shall be of but Fifty Dollars and shall be numbered from one to seven both inclusive.

Section 3. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum payable semi-annually and all the interest accruing on said bonds shall mature and be payable on the first days of March and September of each year, and for which the proper interest coupons shall be attached and made a part of said bonds. Both principles and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Marion, Ohio.

Sec. 4. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and Auditor of the City of Marion, Ohio, officially in their handwriting and have affixed thereto the corporate seal of said City. Each coupon shall have printed thereon a fac-simile of the signature of the City Auditor of the City of Marion, Ohio, and the faith, credit and property of the city of Marion, Ohio are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon at maturity.

Sec. 5. Said bonds shall express upon their face the purpose for which they were issued and that they were issued in pursuance to this ordinance and shall be prepared issued and delivered under the direction of the Finance Committee of the City Council and the City Auditor, and after having the same duly recorded in the offices of the City Auditor and the Trustees of the Sinking Fund, shall negotiate and sell the same for and in behalf of the City of Marion, Ohio, in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 6. Said bonds shall be first offered at par and accrued interest to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund in their official capacity and if the Sinking Fund trustees refuse to take the same at par and accrued interest then said bonds shall be offered at public sale and sold in the manner provided by law but not for less than their par value and accrued interest.

Sec. 7. The proceeds of the sale of said bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury by said Committee of Finance and set aside in a Fund designated as City's portion of street improvement fund. All premiums and accrued interest received from the sale of said bonds shall be transferred on warrant of the City Auditor to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund of the City of Marion, Ohio, to be by them applied in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and earliest period allowed by law.
