## FOR INDOOR WEAR

EXQUISITE EFFECTS IN SATIN APPLIQUE AND LACE FOR EVENING.

Light Mauve is Numbered Among the Most Fashionable Shades This Season—One Piece Broad-cloth Gown.

Dame Fashion still puts her finest efforts on thin gowns for house wear, and some exquisite models are rivaling each other at the smart cafes and at the theaters. Especially handsome was a model noted a few evenings ago, contrived of finest net combined with Spanish lace and appliques of soft liberty satin.

The demitrained skirt bears broad bands of lace, the designs of which are outlined with silver threads, while the network is covered with crescent-shaped bits of satin. A flounce of the lace, so ornamented, finished the skirt, which is close-fitting about the hips. The girde is of liberty satin studded with narrow bands of silk soutache and silver braid.

The effect of the satin appliques upon the naturally rich silk ground of the Spanish lace is delicious, and when to this is added the delicate

tracery of silver embroidery, a garment unexcelled in beauty is gained. The bodice is draped with a bertha of the lace, and in order that its effect may be heightened, there are the side straps of black satin across the shoulders, but they are cleverly worked in with the lace to subdue their effect, while bringing out the full significance of the bodice trimming. Sleeves of net and lace are finished with satin stitched with silver and soutache braid, and the long streamers of satin hanging from the girde are inset with lace medallions, stitched under silver braid.

Since all the gowns of fine materials require a foundation or slip lining, and since the use of soft silks, such as pearly de cygne, surah and one-tone foulards, generally in delicate colors is the rule, it is especially important that special care should be exercised in the selection of a slip. These materials lend a softer glow to the net and chiffon veilings, which are indispensable, and are more appropriate than the stiffer taffetas.

Arkansas will surprise the world this year with her peach crop. Still there are some beautiful embroidered designs, preferably in delicate flower patterns in contrasting colors or in large flat spots, the exact color of the stockings. Stockings should match the shoes as far as possible, but a rather pretty fancy is the wearing of bright pumps as an accompaniment of the natural colored silk and linen gowns.
