TRAIN JUMPS FROM TRACK

Five Cars are Stacked up in Wreck Today.

GREAT DAMAGE IS DONE

Mix-up Happens Short Distance From Leader St.

Yard Engine Shortly Afterward Derailed at Same Spot--Another Train off at New Switch.

Big Four westbound freight train No. 92 jumped the track a short distance west of the Leader street crossing about 9 o'clock Thursday evening, and as a result both the track and the train was badly damaged. The wreck, which was as serious as one as has occurred on the Big Four in this vicinity for some time, was caused by a defective frog in the track. Fortunately, no one was injured seriously, other than an unknown traveling agent, who was badly bruised about the breast.

The five cars composing the train were heaped in every conceivable manner and the engine was derailed. The wrecking crew was busy until late this morning clearing up the wreck. Traffic was resumed this afternoon. During the process of clearing away the wreck an Erie yard engine was brought to the scene to assist in removing the broken cars and it also jumped the track near the spot where the other had been derailed. Additional damage was done in the second accident.

The car situation in the Hocking valley coal district has become most serious, and yesterday but 250 cars were available on the Hocking Valley for coal shipments. One of the largest companies only received 20 cars as the day's allotment. The officers of the road are doing all they can to relieve the situation, but as cars are now being consigned to points on other roads the supply is growing smaller as roads receiving the cars use them in their own business and do not return them to the Hocking. The Hocking Valley receive, few cars from other lines, so the situation results in the Hocking being left without cars for the coal men along its lines.

Erie freight train No. 71, westbound attempted to pass over the new switch, which was swung into place Thursday afternoon, between the tracks of the Chicago and terminate division of the Erie at the Union station, and was derailed. The damage done was comparatively slight, although it required several hours to clear away the wreck. The officials are puzzled over the cause of the wreck as they are certain that the new switch was laid without default.

The Cripple Creek theatrical company arrived in this city this morning over the Big Four road.

Fifteen coaches filled with Hungarian immigrants passed through Marion this morning as a second section of train No. 21.

DR. GAILY HIT BY CAR. Blind Physician Knocked Down and Badly Hurt. HAPPENS ON CENTER ST. WELL KNOWN HERE. Arm is Broken and Body Badly Bruised. Victim Suffers Nervous Shock but Condition is not Dangerous—Starts Across Street Alone. While walking west on Center street last night shortly after 8 o'clock, Dr. C. P. Galley was struck and seriously injured by a north-bound car that was turning from Center into North State street. The doctor is blind and was unable to get any one to pilot him across the street, as his usual custom, so he ventured alone. Apparently he did not even hear the car. Fortunately the impact threw him away from the car. He was picked up and carried to his residence on East Center street, where he was attended by Dr. James Wilson McMurray. The physician found that the left arm was broken at the elbow joint and that the patient was otherwise quite badly bruised. It is stated that Dr. Galley is suffering more from the nervous shock than from his injuries, although his condition is not considered dangerous.

MICHAEL MAST, KILLED. His Engine Collides With a Freight Train. Resided in Huntington for Several Years. Misunderstanding of Orders Caused the Disaster, Which Ended Fatally—Thirty Passengers Injured. Michael Mast, who for many years was road foreman of engines on the Erie, with headquarters at Huntington, Ind., was killed instantly at Letters, Indiana, today. Mr. Mast was serving as an engineer on the road and early this morning the train which he was driving owing to a misunderstanding of orders, plunged into a freight at Letters. Mr. Mast remained on the engine and was instantly killed. Several passengers were fatally injured in the wreck. Five years ago Engineer Mast gave up his position as road foreman of engines and became an engineer. He was not only well known here because of his business trips here, but has made many visits to this city, while serving as engineer. Mr. Mast was one of the oldest engineers on the road and was a most respected gentleman. He had a wide circle of friends in this city, who will be deeply grieved to learn of his sad fate.
