Sporting Gossip.

Another attempt to wrest the lightweight championship boxing title from Joe Gans has proved futile, and the colored boxer is sure of his laurels for some time to come. Jimmy Britt, of California, was a dismal failure. The bout, which was scheduled to go 20 rounds, lasted only five. In the fourth round of the combat Britt, in an effort to land a vicious left swing, broke his wrist. He fought the fifth session and was outclassed, and was unable to respond for the sixth on account of the pain he suffered. Gans was then awarded the decision. Who his next opponent will be is a matter for conjecture, as the champion stands alone. If Britt ever was to hold the lightweight championship his friends thought that his only chance was to get it through his fight with Gans. They gathered at the battle in large numbers, and despite Gans being the favorite, they bet heavily on the novice. Before the encounter the Californian gave his admirers a lot of confidence as he declared he was in the best shape and that he felt sure of winning. Taking this and his excellent showing against Battling Nelson, the fans felt that he was due to give Gans a hard tussle. Gans showed in the battle, after the second round, that he was the better boxer of the two. He hit Britt at will. His cleverness and speed outshone that of the westerner, who was puzzled as to what tactics to pursue in fighting the champion. He had only two effective blows to use on Gans. They were a left swing to the body and a right cross. Every time he attempted to land them Gans was present with a strong defense. Gans used several punches which were effective. He had so difficulty in finding a landing place for them, and several times had Britt boxed by their use.

Daniel Shay, the substitute infielder of the New York National League club, is a native of California and first became noted as a ball player in the California league club in 1901. In 1904 he joined the St. Louis Nationals. In that year he covered short in 87 games, and his batting average for the season was .250. In 1905 he took part in 78 games at short and at second base, and his average with the willow was .238. Shay refused to report to St. Louis in 1906, saying he would not come east on account of the climate. He played that season with the Stock-

ton club, of the outlaw California State league, and conducted a cigar store at the same time. In the deal by which the New York National club got Shannon from the Cardinals last season Shay was included, but he would not join the New York team at that time. Last spring McGraw visited Shay at his home in Stockton, and as a result Shay signed with the Giants. He reported late, however, and has since been used merely as a substitute infielder. He is fast in the field and on the bases, is a good thrower and a hard and timely hitter.

Fred Clarke, manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and his brother, Josh Clarke, who plays with the Des Moines club of the Western league, are not the only ball players in the Clarke family. There is another who is slapping up to put papa and Uncle Fred well into the shade. The third is a chubby boy of four who answers to the name of Theodore and is the pride of Josh's heart.

One day recently Mrs. Clarke found Theodore sitting at her dressing table. "What are you doing?" asked his mother.

"Warmin' the bench," said Theodore.

But the richest came to the attention of Father Josh. "I was coming home one evening," said he, "when in front of the house I saw Theodore some tearing down the street. Just as he reached me he took a headlong dive and landed squarely on his stomach. I rushed to him and asked him if he was hurt and what he was trying to do."

"No, I ain't hurt," said he. "I was slidin' home, and I got there, too."

BLACKS AROUSED

Negro Mob Severely Handles Young Girls Alleged Assault.

Columbus, O., Oct. 26.—J. S. McAllister, an aged peddler of toilet articles was rescued last night from a mob of angry negroes by the police and held pending an investigation. McAllister, in his rounds, called at the home of Henry Pace, a colored laborer, in the East End, where there is a community of negroes.

The peddler showed his wares, so he said, to a girl who was alone in the house. When the mother came home the child charged that she had been assaulted. McAllister returned to the neighborhood later in search of an order book he had lost. Mrs. Pace told her neighbors of her child's story.

In an instant McAllister was surrounded and badly beaten, and but for the father of the accuser probably would have been killed before the police arrived. He is a feeble old man and denies the charge emphatically, but will be held pending a full investigation.
