TWINS TAKE FRENCH LEAVE

Desert Their Wives and Children.

DEPART FOR THE WEST

Forget to Pay Many Neighbors They Owed.

Prominent Farmers Near Caledonia Sell Personal Property and Skip the Country.

Perhaps one of the most unusual cases of desertion ever brought to light in the history of Marion county was disclosed Saturday when it was learned that David and Lee Timson, twin brothers and prominent and well-to-do farmers residing near Caledonia, deserted their wives and families and left for parts unknown.

The rother in question married sisters and were joined in marriage only a few months apart. Through some mutual agreement last Tuesday the twins packed their trunks and without bidding their wives good bye boarded a train and skipped the country.

David Timson held the office of Justice-of-the-peace of Tully township and was very prominent in political circles, while his brother was a prominent resident of Caledonia, and also active in politics. David leaves five children, ranging in ages from 3 to 8 years, while the brother leaves but one infant child.

The deserters cleared up all their business affairs excepting the matter of paying their creditors, the justice of the peace in particular, forgetting a score or more of farmer neighbors who had had great confidence in his honesty.

Although a number of Caledonia people suspected that the husbands had left their families for good, the matter was not definitely made known until Saturday, when one of the wives was interviewed, she acknowledging that the report was true.

The brother in question married his father's farm, which is located about four miles north of Caledonia. They sold all their personal property claiming at the time that they had decided to quit farming.

Although no thorough investigation has been made, the authorities are of the opinion that the pair went to Seattle, Washington. The day that they left Caledonia they were seen in Gallion and it is said that they purchased a through ticket to the Pacific coast from that place.

The deserted wives have but little to say regarding the matter only they declare that they have been left alone with their families to care for. They will probably take steps next week to locate their husbands.


