**CITY COUNCIL FORGOT MONEY**

Necessary to Pay for the Improvement.

**PUBLIC SERVICE BOARD**

Will Do No Work Until Appropriation is Made.

It is Recommended That City Council Purchase a Plot of Land to be Used as a City Dumping Ground.

At a regular meeting of the Public Service board last night the clerk read a resolution passed by council ordering the board to commence the extension of the South Prospect street paving from the south corporation line to the entrance of McKinley park, a distance of between 200 and 300 feet.

When the resolution was read, President Busard asked if council had appropriated any money for the improvement. On being informed that no money was appropriated, he said, "Well, tell them that we will not do it. We do not intend to go ahead with these improvements unless council will appropriate the money."

The city engineer informed the board that the city is to pay one third of the cost of the improvement, the commissioners another third and the Stoltz-Scotfield Land company, the remaining third. When council appropriates the money the board will take up the question for consideration.

It was recommended by the city council that Carner avenue be improved and placed in condition for winter travel between Prospect and Windsor streets. Superintendent of streets Blum was instructed to do some ditching along Carner avenue and to use other means of putting the street in good condition.

On motion of Mr. Morgenthaler the board recommended to council the purchase of a piece of ground in the outlying sections of the city to be used as a dumping ground for night soil and garbage. It is probable that between ten and fifteen acres will be secured which will do away with the most expensive work that the disposal plant is called upon to handle, and will annually save the city a large amount of money. One piece of property, of ten acres, north of Fairground and east of Madison street, has been offered at \$200 an acre and an adjoining piece of property has been offered at \$225 per acre. Before making a purchase council will look over all of the available sites.

The clerk read a resolution passed by council at its last meeting instructing the board to prepare for skating ponds at Lincoln and Garfield parks. The members of the board are of the opinion that council will have to appropriate money for the skating ponds as practically all of the money in the park funds has been expended. It is planned to throw up a small embankment at both of the parks and to fill the enclosure with water which will provide very desirable skating places at small expense. The question will be taken up more at length at the next meeting.

The park superintendent reported a number of matters to the board concerning the parks. He promised to have a complete set of rules for the board to adopt at the next meeting.

The contract and bond of Hottel and Dawson for a sewer and cellar drain on Mound street was accepted and approved by the board.

During the month of November five horses, one dog, thirty one barrels of night soil and 353 barrels of garbage were handled at the

sewage disposal plant according to the report of the superintendent. The collections for the period were \$16.25.

The market master reported collections from October 12 to November 30 amounting to \$62.15. J. Huggins, inspector of the Elm street paving reported that the work has been completed in a satisfactory manner by the contractor. After allowing bills amounting to \$6787.12, the board adjourned.

At the meeting of the health board, following the sanitary officer reported several new cases of typhoid fever and diphtheria.

**DEATH CLAIMS NOBLE WOMAN**

Interesting and Beautiful Life Closes.

**ARTIST OF MUCH NOTE**

Some of Her Paintings Adorn Walls of Whitehouse.

Mrs. Mary P. Shaw Passes Away Tuesday—Loved and Respected by a Who Knew Her.

After an extremely interesting and beautiful life of nearly seventy-eight years, Mrs. Mary P. Shaw, widow of John P. Shaw, died Tuesday afternoon about four o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. F. Kreis, at the corner of Prospect and Walnut streets.

Mrs. Shaw had been in poor health for the past two years, but was able to be about until two weeks ago, when her condition became worse and she was forced to remain in bed. Her demise was due to a general breakdown brought on by advanced age.

Born in Plymouth, Connecticut, she was educated in the best schools in the East, and had an excellent art education. She gained national reputation as a portrait painter and some excellent specimens of her work today adorn the White house and many of the famous galleries of this country. Until a few weeks ago she continued to do excellent work.

The deceased came to Edison, now Morrow county, when a young woman when that town was in Marion county and received the first certificate to teach in the public schools that was ever granted without an examination. She came to this city eight years ago and had since lived here. A lovable woman, devoted to her family and to her friends, Mrs. Shaw was loved by all who knew her. She had been a life long member of the Episcopal church.

She is survived by three sons, M. W. Shaw, Joel T. Shaw and J. L. Shaw; two daughters, Mrs. J. F. Kreis and Mrs. J. S. Deatherage, of Kansas City; two step sons, Alva C. Shaw, of Key West, Florida, and Sylvester B. Shaw of this city, and a sister, Mrs. C. A. Storer, of New York City.

The funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at two o'clock at the Kreis residence, Rev. Edmund G. Mapes, of the Episcopal church officiating. Interment will occur at Marion cemetery.
