FRIDAY WAS DIVORCE DAY

Six Cases Set for Hearing Today.

VERDICT FOR DEFENDANT

Rendered in Case of National Bank vs Herr.

Jury Reaches a Decision Thursday Night After Being Out About One Hour—Court News.

After being out only about an hour, the jury in the case of the Marion National Bank against John Herr, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. The verdict was returned about 6 o'clock Thursday evening. Several years ago while Charles E. Foster, of Cleveland, was here trying to sell stock in the Winslow Voting Machine company, representing, it is alleged, that the company would locate a plant here. Herr took some stock and gave in return his note for \$1,000.

Before leaving the city Foster sold the note to the Marion National Bank and the bank obtained judgment against Herr. Later Herr filed a petition claiming that the note had been procured fraudulently and he asked that the judgment be set aside. The court decided that Herr had a good defense and granted the petition. Then the bank brought suit asking for judgment on the note, and this suit is the one decided by the jury Thursday evening.

It is expected that the case will be carried to the higher courts.

Out of seven divorce proceedings assigned for hearing today, six were heard. Three hearings took place this morning and three more were set for this afternoon.

The cases heard this morning were those of Anna Lloyd against William Lloyd, Addie R. German against A. G. German, and Add E. Shaff-stall against Arthur B. Shaffstall. The cases set for this afternoon are Martin S. Russell against Thule Russell, Lulu Runkles against Benjamin R. Runkles and Lloyd Wilcox against Ethel Wilcox. The case of Bertha Dutt against Earl Dutt has been continued.

SUPT. ALLEN FACES MAYOR

Promises to Keep Crossings Clear.

VISITS MARION THURSDAY

Warrant for Arrest of Erie Official was Issued.

Papers were not Served as Mr. Allen Lost no Time in Calling on Mayor Scherff.

If the promises made by C. A. Allen, Erie superintendent, in the mayor's court last evening are kept there will be few blockades caused by trains breaking in two or from other causes through the central part of the city.

Mr. Allen came over from his headquarters at Gallon Thursday afternoon and as he stepped off the train he was notified that there was a warrant for his arrest at police headquarters. A short time later he appeared at headquarters and talked the question over with the mayor. Mr. Allen was held to blame for an Erie freight train holding the State street crossing for a period of fifty minutes Wednesday evening and determined to put a stop to nuisances of this kind, the mayor and chief of police decided to arrest Allen.

The superintendent told the mayor that he will have a small shanty erected at the entrance to the cross over switch, west of Oak street, and will station a man there both night and day. From the shanty to "Q" tower at Greenwood street there will be a private telephone line installed and no freights will be allowed to pass "Q" tower unless they have a clear right of way to pass down into the yards.

In the past the trains have gone down as far as the cross over switch where the head brakeman had to jump off and turn the switch, making it necessary for the train to come to a standstill on the heavy grade and curve. Then when the engineer was ready to start up again the airbrakes would refuse to release with the result that the train would break in two and occupy

several crossings for periods from fifteen to fifty minutes and sometimes even longer.

Mr. Allen states that the switchman will be stationed at once and that he does not believe there will be any complaints of this nature in the future. On condition that the matter is given immediate attention the mayor had the affidavit withdrawn.

PRISONER ADMITS HE STOLE MONEY

Bucyrus Lad Arrested on Intoxication Charge.

Confessed to Having Taken Pension Money From His Grandfather's Room.

Theodore Friend, a twenty-year-old lad from Bucyrus, was arrested last night on a charge of drunkenness by Officers Bell and Babcock. He was fined \$5 by the mayor this morning and was ordered committed until the fine is paid.

The police secured a confession of the theft of twenty-dollars committed several days ago by Friend. His grandfather, with whom he used to live, received his pension money some time ago and the worthy grandson crawled in a window and secured twenty dollars of the amount. It was for a similar offense that he had been forced to leave the home of his grandparents.

Friend will probably be returned to Bucyrus, where he will be prosecuted.
