HINES' CONFESSION GOES TO THE JURY
 Dayton, O., Dec. 18.—In the case of Layton Hines, the negro, who confessed to the ravishment and killing of Bertha Markowitz, a young Jewess, at McCabe Park Sunday evening, App. 6, the court decided that his confession must go to the jury.

The admission of the confession had been a subject of contention for three days, the attorneys for Hines claiming that the confession was obtained by duress and was not voluntary.
 The confession was made following a number of interviews with the negro beginning at 9 at night and ending at 3 in the afternoon of the following day. The sheriff, coroner, prosecuting attorney and assistants participated in the interviews.

SMALLPOX DISCOVERED IN GIRL'S DORMATORY

Madison, Wis., Dec. 18.—Chadbourne hall, the girls' dormitory at Wisconsin State university, was placed under quarantine yesterday because Hazel Handt of Fon du Lac was discovered to be stricken with smallpox.

All the girls in the hall were vaccinated and sent to their homes. Miss Handt had been ill a week but it was not definitely decided she had smallpox until yesterday. There were 100 girl students in the hall and 200 others took their meals there.

FIRE CHIEF GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Lebanon, Dec. 18.—William Miller, who was on trial for the murder of Joseph Littler, the despoiler of his home, was found guilty of manslaughter this afternoon after the jury had been out more than three hours. His attorneys will file a motion for a new trial and if it is refused will take the case to a higher court.

In his final argument Prosecutor Young said he was not desirous of finding Miller guilty of first degree murder, as the indictment stated.

Miller received the verdict with the same indifference that he has shown throughout the entire trial. Miller, who was the chief of the fire department at Franklin while the latter was in a cell in the city prison at Franklin Sept. 4 last, Miller's wife had run off to Springfield with Littler and Miller had had them arrested and brought back to Franklin.

WILL OPEN THE TOWN

New York Alderman Decides "Blue" Laws are Too Drastic.

New York, Dec. 18.—The board of aldermen yesterday adopted an ordinance which will permit Sunday theatrical exhibitions with certain features common to week day shows eliminated.

The "Doubt ordinance" as it is known, after enumerating as forbidden on the sabbath, nearly every imaginable form of public entertainment, contains the following qualifications.

Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit at any such place or places on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, sacred or educational, vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing provided that such amusements shall be given in such a manner as not to disturb the public peace, or amount to a serious interruption of the repose and religious liberty of the community.
