## STATE LAWS SUPREME SAYS JUDGE HEAP

Chicago, Dec. 19.—Judge Heap, of the municipal court, rendered a sweeping decision in favor of the prosecution against moonshiners for violation of the Sunday closing law. He declared that the defense in such cases cannot introduce as part of its case, the city ordinances giving moon keepers the right to keep open bars on Sunday. ## TAFT IS PLEASED

Talks on the Trip to the Pacific but is Silent on Politics.

On Board the Steamer President Grant (By Wireless, via Halifax, N. S.), Dec. 19.—Secretary of War Taft, who is finishing the last stage of his journey around the world on the President Grant, will probably reach New York about noon next Friday.

In commenting today on the departure of the big American fleet of warships for the Pacific, the secretary said he viewed the undertaking with real satisfaction. He regards the cruise as a necessary practice and valuable as placing the men and ships under conditions approximating a war footing.

"By this cruise, they will gain experience which would not be obtainable in any other way," said he. "It would be useless to spend millions of dollars in building up a navy and then withhold opportunities for practice."

Mr. Taft declared that the cruise has no international significance. He declined to discuss American politics in any way, saying he has no personal knowledge of present political conditions in the United States.

## HOBSON FOR PEACE

Outlines a Plan of Actions for This Country to Pursue.

Washington, Dec. 19.—The first public act of Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson of Alabama, since he became a member of the house of representatives, was his introduction, today, of a resolution for the promotion of peace among the nations of the world. He asked that congress adopt a policy that general treaties of arbitration should be negotiated by the United States with all nations, granting jurisdiction to the international court at The Hague, over as many classes of controversies as other contracting powers in each case can be induced to transfer from the field of war.

He would also have congress advocate the establishment of a permanent international congress to assemble, periodically.

## A DOZEN MURDERED

Yaqui Indians Go on the War Path and Slaughter Mexicans.

Nogales, A. T., Dec. 19.—Information which has just reached here tells of the frightful murder of twelve men by a band of 150 Yaqui Indians, forty-five miles southeast of Magdalena, State of Sonora, Mexico, last Wednesday.

F. J. Melnyk and a party of mining men of this section have arrived from the scene where they viewed the remains of the murdered men.

The Yaquis captured the party of thirteen men. Among the number was Jose Fernandez, son of President Fernandez of the town of Cucurpe, and owner of the Mesal plantation, where the killing occurred. The others were Mexican laborers on the ranch and some miners looking for work.

One American was among the number, but he was rescued by men who told him that they were Americans. The remaining twelve were whipped, stood up against trees, and shot through the head.

A band of Yaquis is reported to be on the war path.

## PARKERSBURG'S BIG MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Parkersburg, W. Va., Dec. 19.—The plant of the Parkersburg Mill company was completely destroyed by fire this morning. The loss is \$100,000 and is covered by insurance. Three hundred men are thrown out of employment.
