## A TOWNSHIP CENTRAL SCHOOL DEMANDED FOR THE SHAWNEES

### Shawnee Township Allen Co., Richest Rural Township in America, Having Best Pikes in Ohio Can Pay Cash for Building Without Issuing Bonds—Shawnees Have Made No Step Toward Tribal Relationship—Advocate of State Centralization Dares the Combined Forces of Chaos to Foist Their Stage Lench Pageantry Upon the Demolishers of Shawnee Township.

Shawnee township adjoins the city of Lima, Ohio, and contains within its limit the Solar Refinery Co. belonging to the Standard Oil company. This township is strictly rural except in a settlement which is a portion of Lima.

The above company pay seventy-two per cent. of the taxes of the township. This township is the richest rural township in Ohio and probably the richest in America. There is a great demand for farms in this county, consequently, land is high. The first information you get from real estate agents, concerning any farm they may have for sale is the low rate of taxes. Farmers who wish to dispose of their farms in this township do not need to advertise the fact, but merely mention the same to real estate agents and buyers come. This township is regular in shape, just suited for a township central high school. The pikes of this township excel any other found in the state. Pikes are essential to the best results in the stage coach method of transportation of children to a central, centralized educational opportunity to attend an output for the Ohio State University.

The teachers of Shawnee township receive considerable more than the average wages paid throughout the state, yet the taxes for school purposes in 1905 were 1 1-2 mills and in 1906, 2 mills. This is not usually the case where schools are centralized. We insist upon this township being centralized regardless of whether or not the majority desire it or know the reason why. This township could build a high school building and pay for it without issuing bonds. We desire to know whether or not this has been the reason that the Indians of Shawnee township have no high school building? Is the building of a school house as serious and momentous as a declaration of war, and must be simultaneously followed by an issuance of bonds?

It is true that only a minority of the inhabitants of this township are politically in harmony with the administration. Is that a just cause for discrimination or is it an evidence that the majority of the inhabitants voluntarily refuse to participate in a "game" operated under a guise of "education" which is producing criminals in proportion to the amount expended for education.

### "IN GOD WE TRUST" OMITTED.

"Secular League" Wins Cession Regarding New Coins.

Washington.—The first of the new coins designed by the late Augustus Saint Gaudens under the general direction of President Roosevelt has reached the treasury department from the United States mint in Philadelphia. It is the \$10 gold piece, or half eagle, and for the first time since 1873 the words "In God We Trust" are omitted from the coin. It is understood that these words will be omitted from the coins of all the other denominations, according to the designs approved by President Roosevelt.

It could not be learned at the treasury department who was responsible for the omission of the words "In God We Trust," but the department officers have had nothing to do with the change in the coin designs except to carry out the orders of the president.

The Secular League of the District of Columbia and other organizations of the same kind have been making an intermittent campaign for years against the use of the name of the Deity in Thanksgiving proclamations and various official documents, and especially against the use of the motto "In God We Trust" on the coins of the nation. All the old coins above the dime bear this motto.

The new gold coin issued from the mint bears on one side an spread eagle holding a number of arrows in its talons and, on the other side the head of an Indian in full war dress.



Students' Practical Test.  
 You won't get fat on crackers and milk.  
 Four days dieting under direction of the medical department of the University of Minnesota has reduced the weight of five men engaged in the experiment from one-quarter of a pound to three and one-half pounds. The sophomore medical class in physiology was given practice in the determination of food values by having some of their number detailed as a food test squad. The men were given three meals each day, each meal consisting of about three and one-half ounces of crackers, one-half ounce of butter and one and two-fifths pints of milk.  
 The comparatively great loss of weight of some of the men, all of whom started in in the best physical condition, is believed to have demonstrated that the restrictions placed upon them would kill the ordinary man in a short time. Meals were served at regular hours, and all the food given was the best to be had of its kind. None of the men ate any think outside of what was served up by the medical department.—Minnesota Journal.
