THE BELL COMPANY MAKES HIGH RATES
And the New Morgan Schedules Will be Same.

Chances Believed to be Good for an Investigation.
Columbus, O., June 1.—The Bell Long Distance Telephone company, Tuesday, put into effect, in Ohio, a new schedule of rates, which, in many instances, represent an increase of 125 per cent. over the old prices.
The United States Long Distance Telephone company, known as the Independent company, but which is controlled by J. P. Morgan & Company, will, on July 1, it is announced, also put into effect a new schedule, also put into effect a new schedule. From reliable sources it is learned that the new Morgan schedules will be practically identical with those put into effect by the Bell company today. The attention of Attorney General Denman was called to the matter today. The chances are that the Bell and the United States companies will be the subject of searching investigations to find out whether they have entered into an illegal agreement to eliminate competition by fixing the same rates throughout Ohio.
The United States rates from Columbus to Cleveland were eighty cents for three minutes; the Bell rate thirty-five cents. The new Bell rate is eighty cents. The United States rate to Dayton is forty cents; the Bell's new schedule raises its rate from twenty to forty-five cents.

HON. LEE BROWNE MUST GO TO JAIL

Chicago, June 1.—Lee O'Neill Browne, Democratic leader of the Illinois legislature, must go to trial on the charge of bribing legislators to vote for William Lorimer, for United States senator.
Judge McShure in criminal court today overruled the motion of the defense to quash the indictment against Browne and ordered the case to trial.
His decision was that bribery in a United States senatorial election is an offense against the state of Illinois and is covered by the criminal statute. All other technicalities interposed by the defense were overruled.
