BOOSTS BEVERIDGE BEFORE LARGE CROWD

Colonel Roosevelt Says Senator Did Not Split With Party.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 14.—Indianapolis, turned out a remarkable crowd. On the platform with the colonel were Senator Beveridge and Mr. Fairbanks, with the county chairman, Harry Mallace, who introduced Mr. Fairbanks, and the former vice president really warmed up. He paid high tribute to Mr. Roosevelt's work and achievements as president, and remarked that he (Fairbanks) had given his whole support to President Roosevelt.

The colzae got an ovation when he arose to speak. The crowd was curious to see him as much as to hear what he had to say. He spoke for an hour and ten minutes. Mr. Roosevelt did not miss matters when it came to blasting Senator Beveridge. He characterized him as a man embodying the struggle for popular government and honesty in public life. He told the crowd that Beveridge did not split off from the rest of his party because he voted in accordance with the views of the bulk of the people, and he said before the next presidential election comes around the platform of our party will be precisely the platform for which Senator Beveridge stands. He said that he had come into Indiana to speak for Beveridge because he believes so emphatically in the cause for which he stands. If Indiana defeats Beveridge, Mr. Roosevelt said that they will not be able to explain to the American people on any other grounds than that Indiana declines to keep in office the public servant who refuses to ally himself with corrupt interests.

Passes Through Columbus. Columbus, O., Oct. 14.—Colonel Roosevelt passed through Columbus at an early hour this morning on his way from Indiana to New York. The train to which his private car was attached stopped 20 minutes at the Union station, but owing to the early hour there was no demonstration.

RAID INVESTMENT CONCERN

Officers Seek Preacher President on Charge of Fraud. Boston, Oct. 14.—Federal officers raided the mahogany furnished offices of the Redeemable Investment company, covering the entire sixth floor of the Lawrence building, seized the books, papers and all the cash in sight and arrested Charles H. Brooks, manager and a director of the company.

The deputy marshal wanted to get the Rev. Norman Plass, president of the Redeemable Investment company, when they raided the office, but were disappointed, and efforts are being made to find him. Lots of literature was put out by the company and some of it contains the alleged in- deedments of President Plass by prominent people, among them being Secretary of the Interior Ballinger, Justice Brewer of the United States supreme court and Senator Curtis.

This means that only members of the Los Angeles will be permitted to work in that city. No motive for the action is ascribed but it is believed to be a development of the ill feeling following the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times. The action cancels the privilege therefore enjoyed by traveling printers armed with international cards to work in Los Angeles.

JOHN HOCKMAN A CANDIDATE

For Common Pleas Judge Met Death by Electric Current Last Night. Defiance, O., Oct. 14.—John H. Hockman, Democratic candidate for common pleas judge, dropped dead while turning on an electric light in the bath room of his home last night. His fingers were burned, and it is believed that he was electrocuted.

Emma Goldman Again. New York, Oct. 14.—Police Captain John F. O'Connor will probably have to explain why he permitted Emma Goldman, noted anarchist, to make an anarchistic speech at the Ferrer memorial services in Cooper Union last night. Ten thousand people, mostly residents of the East Side, attended the meeting. "I came here tonight," said Miss Goldman "to commemorate the death of a great man and to attend three funerals—that of the church for it dominates the human mind; that of capitalism, for it dominates human needs and that of government for it dominates human conduct."

LAD IS NABBED IN CHILLICOTHE

He Will be Committed to The Lancaster Home

HIS SECOND ESCAPE

Was Implicated in Theft of a Horse.

Walter Nece is Already Under Sentence to the Reform School at Lancaster And His Commitment Will be the Result.

The police this afternoon received word from the police authorities in Chillicothe that they had captured Walter Nece, the boy who is accused of having absconded, Thursday morning, with about \$22 and a bicycle belonging to Charles Morley, the east center street meat market man. Chief Klimefoster notified the police to hold the lad until an officer could be sent to bring him back to Marion.

It was learned today, that the lad rode the wheel to the crossing of the C. & M. railway with Bellfontains avenue. There he left the bicycle and boarded a southbound car. This is not the first escapade of young Nece. Just a year ago, he was arrested in Kenton, by Deputy Sheriff Breen after a hard chase in an automobile. On this escapade Nece had accompanied Wilbur Dean who had taken a horse belonging to W. C. Woolly and had driven it to Kenton. The theft was discovered and the sheriff secured an automobile and gave chase, overtaking the pair in the Harlin county capital. The boys were returned to Marion and an affidavit was filed against them in the juvenile court. Both were sentenced to the Reform school at Lancaster, but the commitment was suspended during good behavior. Later it was found necessary to commit the Dean boy and he is now in the institution. Some months later complaint was filed against the Nece lad, but before he could be arrested, the court was informed that he had settled down and was working.

All that will be necessary in the case of young Nece is to return him to Marion and go through the formality of committing him to the industrial school. This will be done promptly. A warrant has been placed in the hands of juvenile court officer S. N. Potts and he will have the lad returned here, probably on Saturday.
