ELEVENTH HOUR CIRCULAR OUT

Cowardly Attempt to Hurt Harmon.

ATTACK ON BASEBALL BILL
Governor is Unfairly Assailed.

Circular Attempts to Fool Voters in to Knifing Harmon—Circular Comes Out at a Time When There is Not Yet Time to Denounce It Over the State—Will Have No Effect on Voters.

A cowardly, underhanded and unfair attempt to harm Governor Harmon over Ohio has been sprung at the eleventh hour. Circulars have been sent out from Columbus and Youngstown to baseball enthusiasts to be by them distributed among workmen who love the game and in fact throughout the whole community wherever it is thought there was disapproval when the Governor vetoed the Sunday baseball bill.

The circular attacks the governor for failing to sign the bill. The base ball fans are asked to vote against a man who is declared to be unfair to the workingman and unwilling to allow him to have baseball on a day when he can see it without laying off. The fact of the matter is that Judson Harmon vetoed the bill because it was unconstitutional and its backers admitted afterward that he was right. The claim was made that the Governor should have signed the bill away.

Hundreds of the circulars were sent here and turned over by the recipient to the Republican county committee. Whether they will be distributed here or not remains to be seen. This much is certain, Marion county having no opposition to Sunday baseball the way it is conducted, could not have possibly been affected by the signing of the vetoing of the measure to legalize the playing of the pastime, and therefore Marion fans have no grievance against the Governor even if the rash statements in the eleventh hour and cowardly circulars were true, which, any fair minded citizen must know are untrue.

STRAW VOTE MANIPULATED

Republicans Corralled in Voting Places.

BALLOTS IMPROPERLY MARKED

Tickets Given Out by Some Republicans

Not Much Dependence Can be Placed in the Result of the Vote Taken in This City Friday Evening and Saturday Morning.

Marion people have been watching with a great deal of interest the straw vote which has been taken in different cities in the state by the Cincinnati Enquirer, but implicit reliance in the returns of such a vote cannot be placed. That is shown by the result of the vote taken in Marion last Friday and Saturday morning. It was known on Saturday that there had been a juggling of the vote up on the part of some of the Republicans in the city and the result of the vote today clearly shows that an effort to misrepresent conditions in this city and county has been made.

Two ardent Republicans are responsible for the statement of just how it was done in some of the returns. A part of the returns on the square, but it is extremely doubtful whether dependence can be placed in the results. The Democrats may have made the figures to suit their side of the case, in some instances, just as the Republicans made their marks to suit their side in other instances.

Two Republicans are authority for the statement that when the Enquirer man entered one place of business to take the vote there were five Democrats and four Republicans present. As soon as one of the Republicans had voted, he immediately went to Republican headquarters and returned with all of the men who could be found there. Each Republican was instructed to mark his ballot to indicate that two years ago he voted for Governor Harmon, but this year he intended to vote for Mr. Harding.

Then two Republicans were stationed at the door and whenever a Republican came along he was collared and brought in to cast his vote while Democrats were steered on up the street.

In other voting places the ballots were placed in the hands of a Republican and he handed them out to Republicans only and each was instructed to mark his ballot that he voted for Harmon two years ago and would vote for Harding this year. The vote in one place was taken after 9 o'clock Friday evening, yet the total vote cast there was thirty-six and the vote taken at another place was 102, a pretty fair crowd for that time in the evening.

There is no question but that the vote taken at some places was on the square and the voters indicated their real sentiment, but taken as a whole there is reason to believe the straw vote in Marion was manipulated.

Take one case where the vote was given at 20 to 82 and the alleged change 54 to 5 and contrast that with the "farmers" vote where there was no chance for manipulation which shows 65 to 25 and the change 4 to 5 and it will be seen how discrepant and inconsistent is the first mentioned ballot. Again take the general canvass 25 to 5 for Harmon and the changes 7 to 3 in Harmon's favor and compare it with the vote where there was a chance to manipulate it and see how they stand at opposite poles.

GOES BACK TO THE HOSPITAL

THREATENS TO SHOOT HUSBAND

Wife's Lover Pulls Gun When Caught.

JOHN JUSTICE FILES CHARGES

Against Jack Lewis in Mayor's Court.

Italian Arrested on Interurban Car With Enough Liquor to Start Gin Shop—Colored Fakery Are Arrested For Starting For Fist on Streets.
Police News.

Jack Lewis, aged 22, was arrested last night by Officer Jones, after Lewis had been apprehended by John Justice, paying court to Justice's wife at the latter's home on west Center street across from the Malleable Iron shop and had threatened to kill the husband when he interfered and ordered him away.

The case was not without melodramatic features. Lewis, it is said, has been paying attentions to Mrs. Justice for some time and Justice has objected to no avail. Finally to save his home Justice left the city to look for another position, informing his wife that he would return for her when he had decided upon a location.

Saturday night the husband returned and going to his home shortly after midnight found Lewis there. Justice intended to give Lewis a thrashing but Lewis was prepared for such an occurrence and produced a pistol, threatening to shoot the husband if he interfered. The police were called and Officer Jones responded. When Jones arrived he entered the rear door and Lewis left by the front door. The officer gave chase and caught Lewis several hundred yards from the house. As the chase started Lewis threw away his revolver but this was recovered.

Today an affidavit was filed against Lewis charging him with menacing in a threatening manner and pointing firearms. He is locked up in the city prison and Justice declares that he will prosecute him to the full extent of the law.

John Lewis was arraigned in the mayor's court this afternoon and pleaded not guilty to the charge. His attorney W. P. Moloney agreed with City Solicitor E. T. Boyd, who represents the plaintiff, to hold the hearing at nine o'clock this evening.

Vincenzo Segismondo, was prosecuted for intoxication on an interurban car by an officer of the Columbus, Marion & Bucyrus railroad today in the mayor's court and was fined \$5. An additional charge of carrying concealed weapons was placed against him by Chief Klinefelter and Officer Jones who made the arrest. The prisoner had two gallon jugs of good whiskey and several bottles filled with it when arrested.

Mike Kunz was taken seriously ill while locked up at the city prison on an intoxication charge. Dr. Rhu attended him and directed his removal to the Central Emergency hospital. It was reported at the hospital that he is recovering nicely today.
