REDUCTIONS MADE
BY CHICAGO PACKERS
By United Press Wire.
Chicago, Nov. 22.—Further blows at
the present high cost of living were
struck here today by the announce-
ment of Chicago packers of general
reductions in the wholesale cost of
beef, mutton and pork. Even the
modest sparerib is slashed one cent
a pound.
Pork loins and tenderloins are al-
so cut one cent and dressed beef
loins, the number 1 cut, are off one
cent, bringing the wholesale price to
17 cents per pound as contrasted with
18 cents, the price last Sunday. Beef
ribs are reduced to 12 and 11 1/2 cents
and a number 1 beef rounds are half
a cent lower.
Most of the cuts of mutton were
lowered in the same ratio though the
steak cuts will remain at the same
figure as before.
"Beef and mutton so far have cost
us the same as last week" was the
comment of retailers here on the an-
nounced reductions. "We have heard,
however, that the cuts will be effec-
tive from now on and you may be
assured that as soon as we can re-
duce prices to the consumer we will
do so, business has been poor and our
trade needs the stimulus of lower
prices. Maybe that's why the reduc-
tions are made. People simply will
not buy when the prices are up."
