Lutheran Church Has Fine Program.

EIGHT CONVERTS AT WESLEY

Rev. J. W. Miles Talks on "Patriotism."

A. E. Smith of Ada is a Visitor at Epworth Church Sunday Morning.

Rev. T. J. Ewald of Mansfield Fills Trinity Baptist Pulpit—Large Congregation Hears Fine Discourse.

Rev. J. W. Miles of the United Brethren church preached a sermon yesterday morning entirely in keeping with the patriotic spirit of the season. "For Zion's sake will I not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest until her righteousness go forth as brightness and her salvation as a lamp that burneth." The speaker said:

"This text expresses the true spirit of patriotism. True patriotism consists of a longing desire that every interest of the nation should be conserved and the true patriot will not allow selfish or personal interests to influence him against interests of his country or community.

"The word patriotism has been translated into every language and its spirit has been exhibited to a greater or less extent in every land. Patriotism is a virtue that must be exhibited in peace as well as war. It may be defined as that love of country which leads the citizen to give to his country that which his country needs at the time his country needs it. In time of war he may be called upon to die for his country; in time of peace his country demands his head and his heart, his intellect and his conscience.

"There is no doubt but that multitudes of our citizens are willing to lay their lives upon the altar of their country. Yet how few there are who exhibit self-restraint and moral courage in dealing with the problems of the government. It is written that he who ruleth his own spirit is greater than he who taketh a city. One can not expect anything to be done as he would have it done or it cannot be expected that every one will receive the reward of which he and his friends may think him deserving; and in hours of disappointment it is well to remember that a person can show more patriotism by suffering for his great cause than by enjoying great rewards.

"The Jews had great respect for localities. They worshipped Jerusalem, Bethel and the Temple. We have sacred places in our national life. We have honored names, days which stand for great events, the greatest of these, Independence day, the fourth of July.

"The supreme motive for the vow made in the text was love for the king, dom of God. This is true patriotism. The man who has good desires will not withhold his personal efforts. He will give all he has if he be really in earnest, or if he be really patriotic."

At Epworth Church.

"These are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ the son of God, and that believing you might have life in His name." From this text Dr. D. H. Bailey gave an excellent sermon yesterday morning taking as his theme "St. John's testimony to the deity of Jesus Christ." In his discourse Dr. Bailey spoke of the various religious beliefs and in this thought made one point especially prominent, that in many of those religions the place of the person or prophet who established that religion might have been taken by others yet said he, "Christianity without Jesus Christ would be impossible." He spoke further of the Christian religion being the greatest of religions because of its wonderful power to save all classes and of all sinners. It is a religion for all humanity and any one may have it if he so desires. Dr. Bailey spoke further of St. John's wonderful testimony of belief and love in the Christ, of his undying devotion during life and in his unswerving belief in the religion through the Savior.

Dr. A. E. Smith, president of Ohio Northern university and former pastor of the Epworth church, was present at this service. Due to a slight indisposition he was unable to fill the pulpit, but at the close of the service he spoke a few words, greeting his former audience with the most cordial words. He stated that he expected to return to Marion in a few weeks and he would occupy the pulpit at that time.

Wesley Church.

Evangelistic services are being conducted at the Wesley Methodist church by the pastor, Rev. H. V. McCleary, assisted by Evangelists Rev. C. E. Rowley and Mrs. Rowley. A great many converts have been made during the past week, eight accepting the Christian belief Sunday.

Rev. Rowley, who is very well known in Marion, having been pastor here for a number of years, assisted in the singing and devotional exercises. At the Sunday evening meeting a duet was sung by Rev. Rowley and his wife which was very pleasing. Alfred Walker, superintendent of the Lima City mission, talked at this service on the subject of the second coming of Jesus Christ. The text was found in the seventh verse of the first chapter of Revelations: "Behold he cometh in a cloud, and every eye shall see him." Mr. Walker exhorted the people to be ready for this second coming of the Master, saying that all that is needed for preparation is salvation. "Let us live our lives," said Mr. Walker, "so that they may be examples to others pointing the way to Jesus Christ."

Services will continue each evening during the week, culminating in the quarterly meeting, which will be held next Saturday.

TYPE OF ALBANIAN SOLDIER NOW IN REVOLT AGAINST TURKEY

Vienna, July 2.—The revolt of the Albanians against the present regime in Turkey is growing more important day by day, Charles E. Crane of Chicago, whose appointment as United States ambassador to China was withdrawn by the state department about a year ago, has arrived in Vienna after a visit to Albania. He says: "The bandits and other torturers are used to intimidate the Albanians. A short time ago a number of prominent old Albanians were bastinadoed in the presence of the assembled public.

"The Turkish commander Taurget Pasha is deservedly called an 'Atilla' with machine guns' owing to his system of ruthless devastation and extermination.

"A handful of Albanians are now fighting against heavy odds. Women fight beside the men.


