### BREWERY MEN FACE CHARGES

#### Six Affidavits Are Filed by Dry Detectives.

### THREE MEN IMPLICATED

#### Each Plead Not Guilty and Furnish Bond.

Charges are Preferred Against Louis Trone, Secretary of the Marion Brewing and Bottling Company, John Able and John Rafferty Employees of the Brewery—Trials Will Begin Wednesday.

As further evidence of the great activity of the dry detectives in this city during the past three months, twelve warrants were served yesterday afternoon and this morning by the police after six affidavits had been filed with Mayor Seiter by William H. Propper charging three employees of the Marion Brewing and Bottling company with selling, furnishing and giving away intoxicating liquors on July 22, August 5, 8, 9, 10 and 11. The employees of the brewery, against whom the charges were preferred, are Louis Trone, secretary of the Marion Brewing and Bottling Company, John Able and John Rafferty whose names appear in the affidavits as John Doe.

Yesterday afternoon Chief of Police Klinefelter, in company with the dry detectives, went to the brewery and placed Louis Trone and John Rafferty under arrest on a warrant charging them with violating the liquor laws on July 22. The detectives accompanied the chief for the purpose of identifying the men, whom they claim to have caught selling liquor.

In company with brewery officials, the two men appeared before Mayor Seiter this morning and were arraigned. They pleaded not guilty to the charges, furnished a bond of \$200 each and were released. Their trial will be held Thursday, October 5. After Trone and Rafferty had been arraigned, Mayor Seiter produced an affidavit charging John Able and John Rafferty, jointly, with selling, furnishing and giving away liquor on August

3. Four other affidavits were produced charging Trone and Rafferty with selling, furnishing and giving away liquor on August 5, 8, 9, and 11.

The men waived the reading of the warrants and when arraigned pleaded not guilty. Bond was furnished in each case and they were released. The latter cases will be taken up after the first case has been disposed of.

These words seem to be his complete vocabulary.

A search of his pockets revealed a slip of paper on which was written, "Charles Morris, 'Mary Morris,' J. B. Morris and 'Gallon, Ohio.'" It is thought that the stranger is from Gallon.

Chief Klinefelter notified the infirmary directors and the demented man was removed to the county infirmary where he will be given medical attention.

Edward Cowan, a showman connected with one of the attractions at the fairgrounds, was arrested by Chief Klinefelter yesterday afternoon and placed in the city prison.

Wednesday morning the chief received a communication from the authorities at Sidney stating that they held a warrant for the arrest of Cowan. At the prison, Cowan informed the officer that he thought he was charged with illegal voting.

Marion Brooks, a drayman, who was arrested Monday on a warrant charging him with violating the health laws of the city, was arraigned before Mayor Seiter yesterday afternoon. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$1.

### SUES HUSBAND FOR A DIVORCE

#### Mrs. John A. Haberman is Terribly Dissatisfied.

### FILES CHARGES OF CRUELTY

#### Claims to Have Received Painful Injuries.

**Wants Divorce, Custody of Children and Alimony—Ohio Sanatorium Company is Appraised and Will be Offered For Sale—Value of Real Estate Fixed at Sixteen Thousand Dollars—Court News.**

Attorney L. E. Myers has filed a petition for divorce in the common pleas court for Mary A. Haberman against John Alfred Haberman. The couple was married in Marion April 17, 1891, and one daughter was born of the union, this child now 16 years of age, being in possession of the mother.

The defendant is charged with extreme cruelty and gross neglect of duty. It is charged that for 20 years the defendant has drunk intoxicating liquors and that about six years ago he threw the plaintiff down a stairway; that in June, 1910, he threw a chair at her, striking her in the face and inflicting painful injuries; that the same month he threw her from a bed to the floor and that he seems to be very jealous, accusing her of being unchaste and untrue.

Plaintiff says the defendant makes himself very miserable by reason of his unjust suspicion of her; that September 25, 1911, he accused her of immoral conduct; that another day the same month he picked up a chair and threatened to strike her, then started up stairs to get a revolver which he threatened to use on her. He is charged with coming home in an intoxicated condition and creating such disturbances that it is no longer possible to live with him.

Mrs. Haberman says her husband owns some property in Marion and will dispose of, or encumber it, unless restrained and will also annoy and torment her unless restrained from so doing.

Plaintiff asks to be divorced, granted the custody of the child, for alimony and that the defendant be enjoined from encumbering his property or removing her. A temporary injunction was issued by Judge W. E. Scofield this morning.


