Knox's Colored Servant.
Washington, March 20.—That colored valet is enjoyed by Secretary Knox at government expense was a new alleged scandal in the state department uncovered today by Representative Hamlin's committee.

"The superintendent of the mailing room at the department tells us that a colored man, formerly employed by Knox, when he was senator, is at present with the secretary on his Central American trip as his personal servant," Hamlin said.

"He said that while this colored man was carried on the payroll at \$1,200 a year, he was apparently working most of the time at Mr. Knox's home."

That Chief Clerk McNier, of the state department, confirmed this story was asserted by Hamlin. The committee is also inquiring into the source of the money used by Secretary Knox for his present tour. The treasury department has ruled that such expenses cannot be charged to the diplomatic funds.

700 Weavers Quit.
Lawrence, Mass., March 20.—Dissatisfied with the way the officials at the Wood Mill, one of the American company group, have put into effect the new schedule, and demanding the immediate discharge of 30 or 40 operatives who did not quit during the recent ten week strike, 700 weavers quietly walked out today. Unless they go back within a few days the mill may close.

Four hundred employees of the D. W. Dingley and Lawrence Lumber company, went back to work today, having gained their demands for a 54-hour week and 10 per cent wage increase.

Wire Trust Pays No Dividends.
New York, 20.—The affairs of the National Steel & Wire company, popularly known as the wire trust, which has a capital of \$10,000,000, will be probed as the result of a suit brought in the supreme court today against Henry E. Huntington, son of the late Collis P. Huntington, and one of the organizers of the corporation, and other members of the executive committee by the British minority stockholders.

The complaint alleges that the executive committee made "false representations" regarding the company to Robert J. Frank and others as a result of which they "invested heavily in the company's securities, on which they have received no return."

An Authoress.
New York, March 20.—Suit for divorce has been brought by Mrs. Mary W. DeChambers, better known as Kate Grewe, authoress, against her husband, H. K. Chambers, dramatist. She names a woman known as "Babe" whom she describes as a "fascinating brunette" as co-respondent, and asks the sole custody of their two-year-old son. The case came up today but went over for one week.

Fram Bound For Buenos Ayres.
London, March 20.—A special cable today from Hobart, Tasmania, says Captain Road Amundson's ship Frank on which he made the trip which ended in the discovery of the South pole, has sailed for Buenos Ayres.

Champ Views With Alarm.
Washington, March 20.—For the first time since he became speaker, Champ Clark acted as a plain representative in the house this afternoon and urged favorable action on a bill to lessen the time required for "proving up" on homestead entries.

"I view with alarm," he said, "the constantly increasing stream of our very best citizens going to Canada to seek homes."

One of The Smiths.
Washington, March 20.—Plea for aid for a wounded American held by Mexican rebels at Chihuahua came in a telegram to Senator Stone from Arthur Jenkins of Dexter, Mo., today. He said A. C. Smith was captured and faced death, though he had taken no part in the Mexican affairs. The state department is investigating.

Fighting Burbank.
Washington, March 20.—Charging a plot exists to give Luther Burbank, the California plant wizard, "twelve sections of government land to establish a cactus propagation monopoly," representative Smith, of California, today opened a fight on the Hayes Bill to deed the land to Burbank.

"This discovery," Smith said, "is a monopoly and I do not see why the government should give land to Burbank."

Three Cent Car Fare.
Columbus, O., Mar. 20.—Eight street car tickets for 25c will be given on all lines of the Rail-Light company, in Columbus, on and after April 29 of this year, according to the announcement of General Manager E. K. Stewart of the company today. Under its franchise, the Rail-Light company was forced to give eight tickets for 25c when its gross receipts from the city lines exceeded \$1,750,000 annually.

Farmers For Woman's Suffrage.
Columbus, O., March 20.—The farmers of Ohio are overwhelmingly in favor of woman's suffrage, according to a mail referendum now being taken by A. P. Sandies, secretary of the state board of agriculture. A similar mail vote by farmers' wives showed them to be less aroused on the subject than their husbands, only about forty per cent of the women expressing a desire to vote.

Sandies has not compiled his figures in full, but says that suffrage will be favored by more than two to one of those answering his queries.

Methodists Criticize Taft.
Philadelphia, Pa., March 20.—Demanding anew "what President Taft has done as chief executive of the United States and as a Christian to relieve the sufferings and oppression of the Jewish people in Roumania, Russia, and in the Turkish possessions of the Philadelphia Methodist Conference today criticized the president when he adopted a resolution calling to his attention their action on their query.

Severe criticism of alleged lack of interest in the Jewish people was made. It was declared that as a Christian he should use his power to lessen the sufferings of these people.

Three Dead.
Seattle, Wn., 20.—In a fit of insanity, A. A. Anderson today shot Drs. W. T. Akey and Samuel Fuskim, inflicting wounds from which both died later. He then sent a bullet into his own body. He will probably die.

No reason is known for the shooting, and the coroner thinks the man became suddenly deranged. Anderson was the patient of the two doctors. Today they went to see him when the man suddenly drew a revolver and shot both down.

DNOUNCED THOMAS.
New York, March 20.—In an open court today Federal District Attorney Wise denounced Washington B. Thomas, president of the American Sugar Refining company, John E. Parsons, the most distinguished lay Presbyterian in New York, and for years attorney for the sugar trust, and their colleagues
