GLIMPSE AT THE UNIVERSE—1880.

Eds. Tel.—The North Star—Polaris—the beacon light to liberty for many a poor slave, is a star of the third magnitude and its estimated distance is a little over one hundred and fifty-eight trillions miles—a distance so great that if our earth should be hurled from its orbit and move through this immense track at the rate of a million miles a day, it would require four hundred and thirty-three thousand years to accomplish the journey to that distant dot in the Northern sky.

When seen under a two thousand magnifying power, we discover two vast suns standing apart more than five hundred billions miles, and each component many times larger than our sun. The star Mira—the yellow star in the dipper handle—is more splendid even than Polaris, the component not more than a third the distance apart, but their distance from us is so immeasurably great that a parallel has not been found to estimate it. Sirius, commonly known as the dog star, is known to have a large planetary body keeping him company, in later measurements made by Dr. Wollaston it is found to be seven trillions miles distant, and fourteen times larger than our sun.

Since 1872 the annual taxation of France has been reduced by 397,000,000 francs. The Franco Prussian war entailed on the country a taxation of 518,000,000. It is predicted by the Minister of Finance that this will be entirely wiped out within three years.
