MAY NOT GET GRANDFATHER'S MILLIONS

New York, March 21—If John D. Rockefeller carries out his intention to give away the bulk of his enormous fortune by establishing a gigantic foundation for philanthropic purposes, his grandson, John D. Rockefeller III, who completes his fourth year today, will lose the distinction of being the richest baby in the world.

However, the possibilities of the future do not worry John D. Rockefeller III at present. He was a remarkably large and healthy baby when he was born on March 21, 1906, and under the strict hygienic regime enforced by his father has grown into a fine and healthy youngster, vigorous and full of life.

John D. Rockefeller has many other grandchildren, but John D. III has always been his favorite, and it has always been understood that the bulk of his fortune would some day descend upon the eldest son of the Oil King's only son.

Accepting \$1,000,000,000 as the basis of their calculations, mathematicians have figured out that this amount, at simple interest of 3 per cent would have grown to \$2,500,000,000, in fifty years.

FIGHT

Is On For The Successor Of Lovering

Boston, Mass., March 21—An election is to be held in the Fourteenth Massachusetts congressional district tomorrow to fill the vacancy by the death of Representative William C. Lovering.

Three candidates are in the field—William R. Buchanan, Republican; Eugene N. Foss, Democrat, and John McCarthy, Socialist.

William R. Buchanan, the Republican standard bearer, is a Brockton editor. In his letter of acceptance he proclaimed himself an opponent of Cannonism, a believer in the income tax and a foe to all trusts that are doing business illegally.

Eugene N. Foss, the Democratic candidate, is one of the most picturesque figures in New England politics. Until about a year ago he was a Republican and had been twice an unsuccessful candidate for Congress on the Republican ticket.

In the announcement of his candidacy for the Lovering seat, Mr. Foss declared himself in favor of free raw materials, lower cost for necessities, better trade relations with "our neighbors," the income tax and conservation.
