PROFFER OF PURSE

To Father Mulhane To Enable Him To Take European Trip

A pleasing incident occurred at the residence of Rev. L. W. Mulhane Friday evening when a committee from the Knights of Columbus called on him and proffered him a purse of \$1200 which they asked him to accept, to be used by him in making a trip abroad the coming summer.

When the new addition was being built to the parochial schools last year the expense for the same was running a little higher than had been anticipated and Father Mulhane used some personal funds, amounting to over \$1,000, which he had set aside for a European trip, and when this became known a movement was quietly started by the Knight of Columbus to raise a purse to reimburse him and thus enable him to make the trip.

When the committee called upon Father Mulhane Friday evening and informed him of what they had done, he was very much moved by their generous action, but he was averse to accepting the money. The committee, however, was insistent, and he agreed to take the proffer under consideration. Father Mulhane has some tentative engagements for the summer that may prevent him from getting away for a trip, and this is the reason for his hesitancy in accepting the offer.

POLICEMAN

Is Sued For Divorce On Friday Afternoon

Rosa Coile Brings Suit Against Virgil Coile

Alleging Cruelty And Other Charges In Petition

Another Divorce Suit Also Filed In Court

Items Of Interest From Temple Of Justice

Virgil Coile, a member of the Mt. Vernon police force, was sued for divorce in the court of common pleas of Knox county late Friday afternoon by his wife, Rosa Coile, on the grounds of extreme cruelty. The plaintiff in her petition states that she was married to the defendant on May 17, 1905, and that one child, Louis D. Coile, aged four years, was born to them. The plaintiff charges defendant with extreme cruelty and states that in March, 1909, she was compelled to leave him and go to the home of relatives in Mt. Liberty. Later she returned and lived with the defendant. She claims that on March 26, 1910, the defendant abused her and charged her with keeping company with other men, which was false. She further states that on March 28, the defendant abandoned her and left her with no means of support, although he is well able to care for her as he is earning \$60 per month. She asks for a divorce, alimony and the custody of the child. Frank L. Levering represents the plaintiff.

Another Divorce Case

Celine Bantuelle has commenced a suit for divorce in the court of common pleas of Knox county against Fernand Bantuelle and the Guaranty Savings Bank and Trust Company. The plaintiff states they were married in April, 1907, and that two children were born to them. She charges the defendant with cruelty and states that on March 29, 1910, he struck and abused her and also struck the child on the head. The defendant is a glass blower and earns \$30 per week. In addition to this the allegation is made that the defendant has \$250 in the Guaranty Savings Bank and Trust Company. The plaintiff asks for an injunction restraining the bank from paying out this sum to the defendant and upon final hearing she asks for a divorce, alimony and the custody of the child. The attorney for the plaintiff is Lot C. Stillwell.

Condemnation Suit

Condemnation proceedings have been instituted in the probate court of Knox county by the board of education of Millwood special school district against Anna Lepley et al. The suit is brought for the purpose of condemning land for the purpose of building a school house. The matter will be heard by Probate Judge Berry on Monday morning, April 18, at 10 o'clock.



EMPRESS AGUSTA MEMORIAL

Jerusalem, April 9.—Emperor William's Mecca for German Lutherans, the church and hospice to be known as the Kaiserin Augusta Victoria Foundation, was consecrated today in the presence of a brilliant assemblage, conspicuous among whom were his Majesty's second son, Prince Eitel Frederick, and his Highness's wife. The picturesque company of onlookers, the historic surroundings and the simple and stately services combined to form a neat impressive spectacle. The church, which stands on the Mount of Olives, will be devoted to services of the Lutheran creed, while the hospice will be used as a convalescent home for sick and suffering Germans in Palestine and adjacent parts. The management of the foundation is to be in the care of the knights hospitaliers, who have carried on their benevolent work of tending the sick and wounded since the 15th century.

MONUMENT TO HARRIMAN

Goshen, N. Y., April 9.—A committee of prominent citizens of Orange county, including former Governor Odell, met here today to devise plans to erect a memorial to the late Edward H. Harriman as a testimonial to his services in behalf of good roads and in the breed of blooded horses.

ANOTHER NEW DESTROYER

Quincy, Mass., April 9.—The torpedo boat destroyer Perkins, built for the United States Government by the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, was successfully launched here today. A large number of guests were present from Washington, Boston and other points. The destroyer was christened by Mrs. Larz Anderson, daughter of Captain George H. Perkins, in whose honor the vessel was named. The Perkins will be of 742 tons displacement, 289 feet long and 26 feet 1 1/2 inches in breadth. She will be equipped with 12,000 horsepower turbine engines. Her armament will consist of five 3-inch .50-caliber semi-automatic guns and mounts, two .30-caliber automatic guns and two torpedo tubes.

Captain Perkins, for whom the vessel was named, was born in New Hampshire in 1836 and graduated from the naval academy in 1856. He served with gallantry in the civil war and was particularly prominent in the naval operations about New Orleans.
