In Every Way Was "May Day" Meeting Of A. I. U.

The annual "May Day" meeting of this district of the American Insurance Union was held in the K. of P. Armory Tuesday evening with a large number of members in attendance. 7:30 o'clock and thirty minutes were spent in routine business after which a class of seventy candidates were initiated.

The initiatory degree was exemplified by a team of twelve ladies and twelve men from Newark Chapter No. 24 under the direction of Captain H. B. McLaughlin, district deputy. The work of the team was excellent and was one of the very pleasing parts of the meeting.

After the degree work was over Mr. H. J. Chappelier took charge as master of ceremonies and introduced the speakers of the evening.

Mr. W. H. Thompson was the first speaker of the evening and in a few well chosen remarks welcomed the visiting members to Mt. Vernon and was responded to on behalf of the Newark Union by Mr. H. W. Hilliar, who expressed their pleasure of being present.

The next speaker of the evening was Dr. Hoagland, National Secretary of the Union, who gave a brief history of the work in Mt. Vernon from the time of his first visit here five years ago when he met with eight members and laid the foundation for the chapter that has now grown to a membership of over 250.

The principal address of the evening was delivered by the Hon. John J. Lentz of Columbus, National President and founder of the American Insurance Union. He spoke of the fundamental principles of the A. I. U., and

showed how the best information obtainable had been used to devise a plan of fraternal insurance that would not have to be changed as the order grew older and at the same time would not be burdensome to those who carried insurance for a number of years. He told of the origin of the step plan of insurance which has since been adopted by a number of fraternal societies. The speaker dwelt upon the benefits to be derived from the fraternalism both by individual and in the home and showed how the fraternal spirit was founded on the Bible and was the secret of good work done by all churches, societies or any organization that worked for the betterment of mankind in any shape. After expressing his pleasure at being present with Mt. Vernon Chapter he closed his address with well wishes for the future of the society.

Mr. Lentz's address was followed by a short speech by Hon. Lewis B. Houck.

The program of addresses was closed with a few remarks by National Deputy H. B. McLaughlin, who has been in this district since March 22, and had helped to get up the class which had just been taken in. He told of his work the past few weeks and spoke very enthusiastically of the prospects for the future of Mt. Vernon chapter.

After the addresses were over the committee served light refreshments and dancing was indulged in until a late hour when all departed for their homes feeling that the "May Day" of 1910, had been a success in every particular.

DISMISSED

Application Brought To Condemn Certain Land

To Build School House In Millwood District

Did Probate Judge Berry Tuesday Afternoon

Cases Disposed Of In Common Pleas Court

In the probate court of Knox county on Tuesday afternoon Probate Judge Berry dismissed the application brought by the members of the board of education of the Millwood special school district for the purpose of condemning land for the purpose of building a new school house in the Millwood special district. The court held that the proceedings were irregular, in that no attempt had been made by the parties connected in the case to come to any agreement over the purchase of land before filing the suit.
