Rendered In Excellent Form By The Participants

The senior class play, "The Courtship of Miles Standish" played to a crowded house at the high school auditorium last evening. The play was rendered in excellent form and nothing but compliments were heard on its production. There were three principal roles. Miles Standish (Dwight Ewalt), John Alden (Earl Baxter) and Priscilla (Anna Swetland.) Miss Seymour showed great judgment in selecting these three as their personalities were peculiarly adapted for the parts that they assumed - Dwight Ewalt with the swagger airs, gruffness and bluntness of the Captain; Earl Baxter as the meek and humble secretary, John Alden, and Anna Swetland as the coy and demure Puritan maiden, Priscilla. The rest of the parts were chiefly silent roles as few lines were spoken. The stage settings were excellent and portrayed very closely and minutely, even unto details, the homes of the early settlers of our country. The Scribner orchestra furnished the music for the occasion and their rendition of both classical and popular music was the cause of much favorable comment on all sides. Donald Harper gave the prologue to the play explaining the reason for the dark settings and for the lack of humor. The following is a synopsis of the play and cast of characters:
