Death Came To George Wideo On Saturday

Found Dead At The Dubinsky Junk Yards

Had Been Drinking Heavily Of Late

George Wideo, the junk and rag buyer, whose face has been so familiar on the streets of Mt. Vernon, was found dead near Dubinsky's junk yards on Saturday morning. At about four o'clock, Mr. Ben Dubinsky was going to the office, which fronts on South Gay street, when he saw Wideo laying on a blanket just in front of the office. On examination, he found that the man was dead and had apparently been so for some time. The coroner was immediately called, but nothing could be found that would indicate that Wideo had not died a natural death.

On Friday evening, Dr. Benjamin Deeley was called to the place near the Dubinsky establishment, where Wideo roomed. On arriving there, he was told that he was sick and needed medical aid. Dr. Deeley found him lying on the ground on a number of newspapers, this being about six o'clock in the evening. It was noticed that the sick man had been drinking heavily, but his condition did not appear to be serious.

The death was probably due to an over amount of alcohol which had been taken into the system, combined with the exposure of lying on the cold ground all night. Wideo has relatives in Mansfield and others in the eastern part of the state.

After the coroner had examined the dead man, the body was taken to the Chappelcar morgue, where it was prepared for burial.

FATAL

Accident Occurs At Homer On Friday

Roumanian Woman Killed In A Runaway

Homer, O., July 16—A fatal accident occurred here Friday afternoon when a middle-aged Roumanian woman was run over by a heavily loaded wagon receiving injuries which caused her death five hours later.

The name of the dead woman could not be ascertained.

The man and woman were driving through the village on a heavily loaded wagon and the former got out to water the horses. The animals frightened at a motorcycle and ran away. The woman was thrown under the wagon and the heavy wheels passed over her chest. Her injuries were such that death resulted five hours later.

THROWN

From Buggy In Runaway But Not Injured

An exciting experience was encountered by a Mt. Vernon woman by the name of Schafer while driving south of the city at about five-thirty o'clock on Friday evening. Mrs. Schafer was riding in a buggy in company with two children, a boy and a girl, and was about three miles south of the city on the Granville road, when, on starting down a steep grade in the road, the horse became frightened at some object at the roadside and began to run. In some manner, Mrs. Schafer and the little boy were thrown from the buggy, leaving the small girl sitting on the seat while the horse ran away. Fortunately, two men were walking along the road a short distance in advance when the accident took place and the horse was captured before it had run very far. The woman and boy, who were thrown to the ground, were uninjured with the exception of a number of minor bruises.

RUNAWAY

On North Sandusky St. Causes Much Excitement

An exciting runaway took place on North Sandusky street on Friday evening at about six o'clock when Mrs. C. Young of near Fredericktown was starting on her return trip home after spending the afternoon in Mt. Vernon. On reaching the Cooper Works, an automobile passed the horse which Mrs. Young was driving, frightening the animal and it ran north on Sandusky street as far as the watering trough where it was caught by spectators. Besides Mrs. Young, a small child was in the buggy at the time of the runaway, but neither of the two were injured. The only damage done was the breaking of the harness in various places.

CHILD INJURED

By Catching Both Of Its Hands In A Hay Baler

Mary, the young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Spearman of Green Valley, had both her hands severely injured Friday afternoon in a hay baler. The fingers on both hands were badly lacerated. Dr. C. K. Conard was called to dress the injuries.

STORY


Of An Attempted "Lynching" In This City


