## To The Members Of The City Board Of Review

## Now Receiving A Salary Of \$3.50 Per Day

## Howard Bartlett Released From County Jail

## By A Writ Of Habeas Corpus On Tuesday

The Knox county commissioners at their weekly session on Monday allowed the members of the city board of review an increase in salary of 75 cents per day. In former years the board received \$5 per day for their services, but this year the commissioners cut the salary down to \$3.50 per day. The members of the board protested against this, pointing out the fact that they gave up their time each day to the work and the compensation was worth more than the amount allowed. On Monday the commissioners voted to increase the salary of each member 75 cents per day, so that they now receive \$4.25 per day for their services. This salary dates from the first day of June when the board first commenced the work of the year.

### Bartlett Released

Howard Bartlett, who has been confined in the Knox county jail for some days past on a charge of non-support of wife and minor child, was released Tuesday morning by Probate Judge Berry on a writ of habeas corpus. The application was made a day or so ago by Bartlett's attorney, B. E. Sapp. After reading the transcript from the court of Squire S. Harter, Judge Berry gave Bartlett his freedom on account of defects in the records in the case. The transcript showed certain agreements between the defendant in the case and his wife, whereby he agreed to pay her \$10 per month, but there was no record of a hearing. It was on this point of the law that the court gave Bartlett his freedom, but explained that he should be compelled to contribute to the support of his wife and minor child.

At the conclusion of the hearing, Squire Harter asked Bartlett if he did not make threats that he would kill his wife and her father when he got out of jail and that Squire Harter would be treated the same way. Bartlett denied that he made the statement and said, "I am not ready for the electric chair yet."

Squire Harter insisted that he could produce witnesses to prove that Bartlett made the statement and concluded by saying, "You will probably have to deny this under oath in a short time."

Judge Berry then gave Bartlett some advice and told him to get that notion out of his head of trying to kill somebody.

## Placed Under Arrest By Officers And Sheriff

As the train stopped and when the tramps saw the officers they started to run in the direction of the Reeves plant with the officers in pursuit. Five out of the seven were captured and locked in the county jail where they gave the following names: Carlos Abbott, Pearl Walter, Frank Tutrow, William Jones and James Hagans.

# RENDERED

## Unconscious For Two Hours Was Russell Sellers

## In An Accident On Monday Afternoon

Mr. Russell Sellers of North Sandusky street was very badly injured while at work at about three o'clock on Monday afternoon. Mr. Sellers, who is employed at the Keifer meat shop, was at the slaughter house, east of the city, and was assisting in an attempt to drive a steer up the chute to a point where it was to have been killed. The steer began to act in an erratic manner and Mr. Sellers ran swiftly up the chute to head it off when his forehead came violently in contact with a heavy plank, which had been nailed across the chute about five and one-half feet from the floor. He was thrown backward and was rendered unconscious by the blow. He was immediately placed into a buggy and driven to his home on North Sandusky street where Dr. S. E. Deeley was called as soon as possible. The injured man remained in a state of unconsciousness for about two hours after the injury. On examination, it was found by the physician that the injury was not necessarily of a serious nature, but the greatest of caution must be exercised in order to keep it from becoming dangerous.
