TRANSLATION

Exhibited above is a fac-simile of a letter written by H. W. Myers, a canal collector, to Secretary Diehl of the state board of public works. It is an exact reproduction in style, size, handwriting, punctuation and spelling. During the nine months of 1910 ending Aug. 1, Myers drew \$315 for salary and expenses, and his total collections were only \$35.68. The letter shows that canal collectors, having few official duties, ARE PAID FOR DEVOTING THEIR TIME ALMOST ENTIRELY TO POLITICS TO PERPETUATE THE CANAL GRAFT. The letter also shows why the canal ring is so anxious to beat Harmon. Myers is the canal collector at Defiance, the home of Wm. REPRIMANDED BY PARENT A LAD DRINKS ACID

Philadelphia, Nov. 2.—"I am sorry. I don't want to die now." Almost before the sentence was finished, 14-year-old Charles Freeman, Jr., of 3181 Edgemont street, fell to the floor writhing in agony, a moment later lost consciousness and died before a patrol wagon arrived to take him to a hospital. The youth was a suicide, apparently without any real cause, and had swallowed a large quantity of carbolic acid. The only explanation that the bereaved parents were able to give was that their son was even more sensitive than they had known, and that he had brooded deeply over his father's reprimand because he desired to leave high school and go to work. Stabbed to Death by Unknown. St. Clairsville, O., Nov. 2.—While milking a cow at his home near Black Oak, Andy Bersack, a Pole, was stabbed to death by an unknown foreigner, who escaped. Bloodhounds are trailing him.

OBITUARY Mrs. Ella Carver Mrs. Ella Carver died at her home in Lock on Tuesday evening at five o'clock after an extended illness caused by anaemia. The deceased had returned to her home from Mt. Vernon hospital several weeks ago in what was thought to be a much improved condition, but later was taken worse. She was 48 years of age and is survived by her husband and one sister, Mrs. Carey Ewart of Morgan Center. The funeral at the M. E. church in Lock on Thursday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. TRAIN Was Wrecked But Only One Man Hurt New York, Nov. 2.—The Buffalo express of the Lackawanna railroad which left Hoboken at 2:25 o'clock this morning with 300 passengers on board was wrecked by a misplaced switch at South Orange today. The big "humpback" engine was turned turtle, three cars were demolished and the rest were derailed. A remarkable feature of the accident is that only one person was seriously injured, while two others were bruised.

YEGGMEN Blow Bank Safe And Get Away With \$8,000 A Daring Burglary At Hilliard Near Columbus Columbus, O., Nov. 2.—Daring yeggmen blew open the safe of the Merchants' & Farmers' bank at Hilliard, ten miles northwest of Columbus, some time after Tuesday midnight, and took between \$5,000 and \$10,000 in gold and currency, according to officers of the bank. Two charges of nitro-glycerine were used, the door of the safe shattered and the interior of the safe rifled. After the robbery the yeggmen walked a block and a half west of the bank, entered the stable of Dr. R. K. Francis, a veterinarian, took out his horse and buggy, cut all of his harness, except what they stole, to pieces so that he could not follow them, and made good their escape.
