GOOD ROADS

Discussed By Mr. C. S. Ashbrook Of Mansfield

At A Regular Meeting Of Citizens' Association

Urges Good Roads All Over Knox County

The regular monthly meeting of the Citizens' Association was held Wednesday evening in the city council chamber at 7:30 o'clock. About twenty-five members were present. President Penn was in the chair and the minutes were read by Secretary McCrackin and were approved.

Upon motion the regular order of business for the evening was suspended and Mr. C. S. Ashbrook of Mansfield, Vice President of the Good Roads Federation of Ohio, was introduced and delivered a most entertaining address of "Good Roads."

Mr. Ashbrook first outlined the campaign pursued by the citizens of Mansfield in establishing good roads in Richland county. He stated that at the present time there are 90 miles of excellent roads in Richland county and that additional good roads are being constructed at the present time.

The speaker suggested that a committee be appointed by the Citizens' Association at once for the purpose of getting the proposition before all the citizens of the county for the betterment of all roads in Knox county. Mr. Ashbrook stated that the matter should be taken up at once in order that the roads be prepared for spring travel. The speaker further stated that application should be made for state funds by this committee.

At the conclusion of Mr. Ashbrook's address, remarks were made by Mr. W. P. Bogardus, Rev. L. W. Mulhane and Mr. John Cunningham along the line of good roads for Knox county.
