And the Payne-Aldrich bill was "the best tariff bill ever constructed!" Evidently the trusts and "interests" are beginning to reap the whirlwind. The voters of Knox county did their full part Tuesday in accomplishing the re-election of Harmon.

MEANING OF THE ELECTION The political storm which started in the DeArmond district in Missouri a few months ago, showed itself in congressional districts in Massachusetts and New York and in the state elections in Vermont and Maine, culminated in a regular cyclone Tuesday, sweeping the country from end to end. It was a vote of general rebuke to the policies of those who have been in control of the Republican party, a condemnation by thousands upon thousands of the voters of that party of their leaders who had betrayed them, and a general lack of confidence in conditions for which the Republican party, as an organization, is held responsible. The influence that operated in the other states also existed in Ohio and had a strong bearing in bringing about the sweeping victory for the Democratic ticket, but beyond all this was the fact that for nearly two years Ohio has had a Democratic governor in the person of Judson Harmon who has done things and who has in every way made good. The splendid record he has made in office was of incalculable benefit in the campaign. His record was that of an honest public official endeavoring to give to the state a good administration and of exposing and rooting out the grafters who have been robbing the state, and whose efforts were constantly hampered in every direction by Republican state officials and an adverse majority in the legislature. The people of Ohio readily saw these things. They had confidence in Judson Harmon and wanted the good work he inaugurated to go on. They

want grafting stopped and the business of the state, in all departments, honestly conducted. That's why they voted the way they did Tuesday. The result in Ohio Tuesday must also be taken as a rebuke to the national administration, and coming with such force in the president's own state it is of great significance. The way the electors throughout the country cast their votes Tuesday has also another meaning—it unmistakably portends the election of a Democrat as president of the United States two years hence, and it is altogether probable that Judson Harmon of Ohio will be the man. DIX VOTE IS HEAVY Has Plurality of 68,000 Over Republican Candidate. New York, Nov. 9.—By a plurality of 60,000, John A. Dix, Democrat, is elected governor of New York over H. L. Stimson, Roosevelt's candidate for the office on the Republican ticket. The remainder of the Democratic state ticket is elected by reduced plurality. The Republicans lost every member of congress in greater New York, except Wm. M. Calder, in Brooklyn. The legislature on joint ballot will be Democratic, thus insuring a successor to Chauncey M. Depew of like political faith. The vote cast in the state of New York is perhaps the most surprising feature of the election. More than 150,000 electors remained away from the polls. Dix, although triumphant by 60,000 plurality, will receive 40,000 votes less than Chandler. He will receive fewer votes than Hearst got 2 years before Chandler ran and fewer votes than Herrick 2 years before Hearst. Stimson will not receive within 100,000 of the vote that went to Hughes two years ago and hardly within 90,000 of the vote that went to Higgins six years ago. In no county above the Harlem bridge is there any increase in the Democratic vote. In some districts above the Harlem the loss was 20 percent, but the loss in the Republican vote is as high as 40 percent in several sections of the state.

New York City's rockbound Republicans districts as the 25th and 29th were carried by the Democrats, while heavy Democratic districts showed no increased majorities for the party, and an actual decrease in several instances. Dix for governor carried Oyster Bay, and carried Roosevelt's election district by a handsome majority. Both Nassau and Suffolk counties probably have been lost to the party and the election of Martin W. Littleton to congress over Coombs (R.) is the result of the desire there to punish the Republican leader. Powers Goes To Congress. London, Ky., Nov. 9.—By a vote which is about one-half normal Republicans in the 11th congressional district, Caleb Powers three times tried for complicity in the murder of Gov. Wm. Goebel and finally pardoned by Gov. Willson, was returned winner in the race for Republican congressman of this district over Eliza Bertram, (D.). The majority of Powers was about 3,000, which is far below the lowest returns that the Republican party ever suffered in the eleventh. Two Socialists In Congress. Milwaukee, Nov. 9.—Milwaukee, the city of Socialists, will be represented in congress by two Socialists as the result of the election. This means that with the other eight Republican districts in Wisconsin returning the incumbents, that the Badger state Republican delegation will be eight as against 10 in the

Colquitt Defeats Ferrell. Austin, Tex., Nov. 9.—The total vote in Texas was less than 300,000, which is 200,000 short of the qualified voting strength. Of this number, O. B. Colquitt, Democrat, received 225,000 and J. O. Terrell, Republican 75,000 votes. No important state issues were involved in the contest. Cannon Re-Elected. Danville Ill., Nov. 9.—Uncle Joe Cannon was re-elected to congress from the Eighteenth district by a plurality of 8,000. Mack Votes Republican Ticket. Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 9.—Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic national committee, voted the straight Republican ticket. It was an error, however, that could not be rectified. Subsequently he told of the joke on himself. Arkansas Solidly Democratic. Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 9.—Arkansas voted for congressmen alone, the state election having taken place in September. A light vote was polled throughout the state, being fully forty percent smaller than the election in September. The state returns a full Democratic delegation to congress.
