

# TO TEST

**The Eyesight Of Pupils In The Mt. Vernon Schools**

**And Later Physical Examinations May Be Made**

**The Board Of Education So Decides At A Meeting**

**The Price Of Gas For School Buildings Increased**

**Other Important Matters Transacted By The Board**

The board of education of Mt. Vernon met in regular session Tuesday evening at the office of Clerk Coyner. The meeting was called to order with President C. N. Lorey in the chair. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved as read.

Dr. G. D. Arndt of the supply committee reported that orders had been issued for all supplies needed during the past month and that all of the work required of that committee had been disposed of to date.

A communication was read from Mr. Upham of the Upham Gas Co. stating that the price of gas would be raised to fifteen cents per thousand in the near future. This caused a discussion on the question of fuel. The matter of gas or coal was not settled, but as the condition of things now stands, something will probably be done in a short time.

A petition from the First Ward Mothers' Club, asking the board for a piano so that music might be furnished at the meeting of that club during the early part of December, was read by Clerk Coyner. On motion, the request of the club was granted.

A petition signed by the entire Senior class of the Mt. Vernon High school, excepting one, was read to the board. In this petition, the members asked that they might not be required to write an essay or deliver an oration at the close of the school year, for reasons which were specified in the petition, and that they might be permitted to give a class play instead of the essays or orations, which the board had decided upon at a previous meeting.

In regard to this petition, Dr. Arndt moved that the students be allowed to prepare their essays or orations and deliver them some time during the present school year; but deliver them before the student body of the High School at the chapel exercises, which are some times held in the morning before the regular school work begins, but that the students be relieved of the essay or oration work providing that they take part in the annual debates, either preliminary or final. Dr. Arndt, in his motion, also provided that the superintendent and the faculty determine the length of the various essays and orations and that they be given in the place of the many themes and other English work which is done during the year. The motion prevailed.

The motion further asked that the Senior class be permitted to give the Senior play instead of the orations and essays but as they must be given in some form at some time, the board did not give the play proposition very serious thought, but decided to leave the matter open and if the class chose to give the play, no restriction would be made by the board.

At this point, the bills were exam-

ined and read by Clerk Coyner. On motion they were ordered paid. Clerk Coyner moved that the superintendent be instructed to purchase test cards, for the purpose of testing the sight of each student in the various schools throughout the city and that one card be secured for each building, and that the superintendent also be allowed to secure postal cards by which the parents can be notified of the defect of the pupil's vision. The motion carried.

This was only one of the various matters discussed relative to an examination of every student in the schools. If the idea of the board is carried out, each student will undergo a thorough physical examination, made by a physician. This has been adopted by many schools in the larger cities and is strongly favored in Mt. Vernon.

On motion, it was decided that all teachers of the public schools of the city, who attended the meeting of the Central Ohio Teachers' Association at Dayton, several days ago, receive their regular salary for the time they were absent from the city, but that the teachers who did not go, receive no compensation for the time which was missed during the convention. This was a topic of a great deal of consideration, but the above plan was finally decided upon.

After a number of minor important matters had been transacted, the meeting was adjourned.

# VERDICT

**For Plaintiff In The Case Of Shaffer Vs. Burke**

**The Jury Also Refuses To Set Aside A Will**

**Last Will Of Henry Robinson Filed In Probate**

**Gives Estate To His Wife And Grandchildren**

**Other Notes Of Interest From Temple Of Justice**

The case of Frank Shaffer vs. T. E. Burke was tried before the jury in the court of common pleas on Tuesday. This was an attachment case, wherein the plaintiff attached a carload of goods belonging to the defendant at Fredericktown some years ago. The jury was out but one-half hour and returned a verdict for the plaintiff for \$168.35.

The case of W. H. Mills vs. John Cramer, executor, was also tried before the jury in the court of common pleas Tuesday. The suit was brought for the purpose of setting aside the will of Margaret Divebliss, but the jury returned a verdict for the defendant, holding that the document was the last will and testament of Margaret Divebliss.

The case of Starner Vs. George was tried before the jury on Wednesday. This case involves the sale of the City Bottling works.

### The Robinson Will—

The last will and testament of Henry Robinson, late of Brandon, has been filed in probate. By the terms of the will he gives to his wife, Caroline, all his property, both real and personal, household effects, etc., provided she remains his widow, and in case she should again marry then she is to receive only that portion she is entitled to by law. At the death of his wife he gives the sum of \$500 to his son, Lewis Robinson. At the death of his wife or in event of her remarrying the testator gives to his grandchildren Ralph Robinson, Erma Robinson and Carl Robinson the sum of \$1,500 each. The residue of the property is to be divided equally among his four grandchildren as follows: Ralph Robinson, Erma Robinson, Carl Robinson, and Lucella Robinson. J. B. Waight is named as executor of the will which was signed December 27th, 1907, in the presence of J. B. Waight and Frank Moore.

### Action For Money—

Edward Bell has commenced an action for money in the court of common pleas of Knox county against Fannie Hawke and Charles Hawke. The amount claimed is \$146.15, the action being based on a promissory note, bearing interest at eight per cent, from November 7, 1910. Park B. Blair is the attorney for the plaintiff.

# SHOT

**In The Face Was Robt. Glasgow In This City**

**While Hunting On Infirmary Farm Tuesday**

The first hunting accident of the season reported in Knox county occurred on Tuesday afternoon at about four o'clock when Mr. Robert Glasgow of this city, received a number of shot about the face from a shot gun. Mr. Glasgow was hunting in company with Superintendent McManis of the Knox county infirmary, on the infirmary farm, when a rabbit was suddenly discovered. The men were some distance apart, some brush separating them and as Mr. Glasgow did not see it, he was not expecting a shot. Mr. McManis, however, sent a load of shot from his gun at the rabbit, four of the shot striking Mr. Glasgow in the face, one entering just below his left eye. He was taken to Mt. Vernon where surgical attention was immediately given the wounds. Three of the shots were easily removed, but the one under the eye has not yet been extracted. The eye will not be injured and no serious results are expected to follow.

# CHICKENS

**Poisoned By Wholesale In East End Of City**

**Miscreants Throw Corn Soaked In Lye In Loop**

A few grains of corn were also thrown into Tony Cervenka's coop and three or four chickens were found dead Wednesday morning.

Chief Dermody was called to make an investigation of the case Wednesday morning, although there is no clue to the guilty party or parties.
