

GRAND JURY

Makes A Report At 3:30 Monday Afternoon

Making Public A Number Of Indictments

While Four Are Not Given Out At Present

Jail In Unsafe Condition Says Grand Jury

Other Items Of Interest From Temple Of Justice

At 3:30 Monday afternoon the grand jury of the November term of common pleas court reported to Judge Seward.

During the session of the grand jury, which lasted just one week, 14 cases were examined, 63 witnesses gave testimony and 12 true bills against 9 persons were returned. Eight of the indictments were made public by Prosecuting Attorney James A. Schaeffer Monday afternoon and 4 were withheld from publication, pending the apprehension of the defendants.

The indictments returned were as follows: Leander T. Wilcox—Incest on Viola May Wilcox.

Samuel Beeman—Burglary. Samuel Beeman—Carrying concealed weapons.

Robert Doty—Petit larceny. Carl Bartlett—Petit larceny. Charles Suttles—Rape on Eliso May Lepley.

James Deal—Burglary. Howard Bartlett—Neglect to provide for minor child.

A lengthy report was made by the grand jury in reference to the unsafe condition of the Knox county jail. The members of the grand jury recommended that the state inspectors of buildings be requested to inspect the county jail and determine whether or not its condition is unsafe and if found to be in such condition that it be condemned.

The report showed that the upper floor of the county jail is used as a detention ward for juveniles, awaiting a hearing. The report showed that this section of the jail was an unfit place to confine children. The grand jury urges the county commissioners to provide a detention home for juveniles as prescribed by law.

Judge Seward is accepting the report of the grand jury stated that the court was quite familiar with the reference to the Knox county jail, stating that for the past several years grand juries have been making just such reports concerning the unsafe condition of the jail.

In behalf of the citizens of Knox county, the members of the bar and the court, Judge Seward thanked the members of the grand jury for their efficient work.

Common Pleas Court—

Owing to the sickness of the plaintiff in the case of Bradfield vs. Christel, which was to have been tried before the jury in the court of common pleas Monday, was postponed and there were no jury cases tried during the day.

The case of A. T. Fulton vs. the McConnell Company has been passed until November 28.

The case of Schnobly, treasurer, vs. Cox has been continued.

The case of Schaeffer vs. Burko was the first case on the assignment for Tuesday.

Action for Money—

Frank Reeves has commenced a suit in the court of common pleas of Knox county against A. L. Byrns, claiming there is due him the sum of \$100, money loaned the defendant on September 20, 1909. The plaintiff also asks for interest from the above date. James A. Schaeffer is the attorney for the plaintiff in this action.

A Civil Action—

Frank Reeves has filed a suit against A. L. Byrns and A. J. Solomon in the court of common pleas of Knox county, alleging there is due him the sum of \$120 for the care of horses be-

longing to the defendants from September 1, 1909, to September 30, 1910. The attorney for the plaintiff is James A. Schaeffer.

Case Appealed—

In the case of Jacob Higgins vs. Newton Miller an appeal has been filed in the court of common pleas from the court of Squire S. Robert Beet of Hilliard township, where the plaintiff obtained a judgment for \$15.

The Horn Estate—

Case Furnishes Excitement For Shelby People

Warrant Issued For Arrest Of A Man

Shelby has a bigamy sensation and a man by the name of Edward Weaver is being sought by the authorities of that place.

The following is a dispatch from Shelby: Edward Weaver is being sought on a warrant charging him with bigamy, as the result of a dramatic meeting here by two women, each claiming to be his wife. Weaver, thirty, fled after being confronted by both women.

An strange woman knocked at the door of Mrs. Roush's boarding house here Saturday morning and inquired for Weaver.

"I am his wife," she said to Mrs. Roush.

"That cannot be," answered the landlady. "His wife is upstairs."

The caller seated herself in the parlor, while Mrs. Roush called the other woman downstairs. Each introduced herself to the other as the only genuine Mrs. Weaver. Finally the caller flashed a marriage certificate, showing that she had married an Edward Weaver in July, 1903.

The other fainted and at this juncture Weaver entered the house.

"I've come from Hagerstown, Md., to get you, Ed," said the caller. Weaver brushed by her and knelt beside the second woman, who was on the floor where she had fallen. When she revived, the three held a consultation, whereupon Weaver promised to return to Maryland with the woman claiming to be the original wife.

"But first I must go to the mill and draw my pay," he said. She consented. For a while the women compared notes. Mrs. Weaver No. 2 said that Weaver met her only a few months ago, while she was playing a piano in a moving picture show here. She was Miss Hattie Brizentine and her home was in Elyria. Weaver made violent love to her and they were married four weeks ago at Norwalk, she said.

Weaver didn't come back. Then Mrs. Weaver No. 1 went before the mayor and swore out a warrant, charging him with bigamy.
