

SOLICITATION

Of Sale Of Liquor In "Dry" County

Either By Letter Or By Other Methods

Is Unlawful Is Holding Of Supreme Court

Columbus, O., Dec. 20—In the case of the State of Ohio against W. H. Hayner, charged with a violation of the Rose county option law for the soliciting of orders for the sale of liquor by letter in Knox county, O., the judgment of the lower courts was sustained today by the supreme court.

In another liquor case, the State of Ohio against Walter Schean, taken up from Tuscarawas county, the supreme court holds in a decision rendered today that breweries in "dry" counties cannot sell either wholesale or otherwise in that county.

LOVERS

Deaf And Dumb Embracing On Track Are Run Down

Janesville, Wis., Dec. 21—While two lovers, deaf and dumb, embraced madly on a railroad track here last night they were run down by a fast passenger train, which instantly killed the girl, Rose Lee, of this city, and fatally wounded her lover, Roy Tansson, of Rockford, Ill., who had come to Janesville for a call.

He was about to take an interurban electric car for home, and when the two were saying their farewell the train rushed upon them, and they did not hear the whistle, owing to their affliction. The girl was thrown 60 feet and was dead when picked up.

The man suffered a fracture of the skull and both legs were broken. He cannot recover, the doctors say. The two were students together at the State School here for the deaf, graduating last June.

YULE TIDE

And Style Of Celebrating For Christmas Entertainment At Congregational Church

London, Dec. 21—The old-fashioned style of celebrating Christmas, with the blazing Yule log in the fireplace the merry family seated around the festive board, which is groaning under its load of choice viands, including such delicacies as boar's head, venison and plum pudding, is a thing of the past so far as London is concerned. It may still survive in the households of well-to-do country gentlemen, conservative enough to preserve ancient traditions, but in London the custom has died out. The rich leave their town houses to take their families to some fashionable seaside resort, where they spend the holidays amid the discomforts of crowded hotel life; and the poor stay at home and enjoy their holidays according to their means and taste; but there are no yule logs nor any of the famed accessories of an old-time Yule tide celebration.

The royal household, still in mourning for the late King Edward, will spend the holidays in a comparatively quiet manner. The King and the Queen and the members of the royal family will celebrate Christmas "en famille" at York Cottage, their charming estate in Norfolk. Although quietly and unostentatiously, elaborate preparations have been made for the Yule tide celebration. There will be plenty of good things for the table, including boar's head and cygnet and a liberal supply of plum pudding, made in accordance with the famous receipt, preserved in the royal family for more than a century. There will be presents for all members of the family, a family gathering around the Christmas tree in the hall and a distribution of presents to the retainers of the King's estate.

King Edward loved to have a number of intimate friends around him at the Yule tide season and invariably had a large house party at Sandringham at that time, but King George, limited by the rules of mourning etiquette, will forego the pleasures of a gathering of congenial friends this Christmas, whatever he may choose to do in the future.

Christmas trade was not quite so brisk last year, owing to the unsettled condition of things caused by the excitement of the political campaign and the industrial strikes and disturbances which have considerably reduced the purchasing power of the poorer working classes. The demand of a cheaper grade has been larger in comparison than for some holiday seasons past.
