

# INJURIES FATAL TO YOUNG MAN

## Wm. Coleman Dies From Injuries Received In Coasting Accident

### Accident Occurred In Academia Tuesday Night

### When Sled Crashed Into Hitching Post

### Four Persons On The Sled Received Injuries

### All Were Students Of The Mt. Vernon College

The Mt. Vernon Medical and Surgical Sanitarium, Dr. V. L. Fisher and Dr. Staunton E. Deeley were the attending surgeons and an examination revealed the fact that the injuries were of a very serious and perhaps fatal character. The left chest was crushed in so that the ribs had punctured the left lung. The right arm was crushed into a pulp at the elbow and two large bumps were discovered, one behind each ear, which produced a slight concussion of the brain.

Everything possible was done by the surgeons to save the man's life, but the internal injuries were such that surgical attention was of no avail and death came at 9:45 o'clock. Shortly before his death Coleman regained consciousness and talked about the accident, but he soon lapsed into unconsciousness and was in this condition when death came.

As a result of injuries received in a coasting accident on the Wooster road, north of the city Tuesday evening at 5 o'clock, William Coleman, aged 20, formerly a senior at Mt. Vernon College, died at the Mt. Vernon Medical and Surgical Sanitarium at 9:45 o'clock the same evening. His death was due to internal injuries.

Coleman, with a party of companions, had been spending the latter part of Tuesday afternoon in coasting down the steep hill on the Wooster road. In coasting down the hill it is necessary for the coasters to cross the public highway leading to Hiawatha park and traffic at this point is sometimes heavy. Coleman was guiding the bobbed and just as the sled reached the cross-road at the foot of the hill, traveling at a terrific rate of speed, the delivery wagon of Rowland & Company appeared just in front of the sled. With presence of mind Coleman turned the bob-sled in time to avoid striking the wagon, but immediately behind the wagon a number of ladies were walking. Again Coleman turned the sled to the left side of the road, but this time he turned too far and crashed into a hitching post, cutting it off to the ground. Coleman was evidently rendered unconscious when the sled struck the post for the sled went crashing over into the ditch at the side of the road. Coleman was picked up unconscious and it was discovered at once that he had been badly injured.

A call was sent for an ambulance and Chappellear & Company responded by removing the injured man to

## SERIOUSLY

### Injured In A Coasting Accident At Bladensburg

### Master George Mellick Is Injured Internally

Master George Mellick of Bladensburg met with a serious accident while coasting in that village on Tuesday evening at about 5:30 o'clock.

The boy was coasting on the sidewalk which is located on a very steep embankment in that village and was the leader of a number of sleds which were going down the hill in single file. Just as the bottom was reached, something occurred to swerve the sled on which Mellick was riding, and it struck a telephone pole, the rider being thrown against the pole. The sleds following began to strike and pile up on the unfortunate boy and his sled, and as a result he was rendered unconscious by the combined effect of striking the pole and the numerous blows which he received when the other sleds struck him. As soon as possible, he was carried into a neighboring house where he was revived and was able to walk home. Dr. W. Pennell of Mt. Vernon was called in attendance and after an examination it was found that he had sustained internal injuries and that his condition is serious. No bones were found to be broken.
