

PRAISE HARMON IN RESOLUTION

Democratic Platform Also Indorses Unit Rule

Senator Pomerene Fails To Land Permanent Chairmanship Of Toledo Convention Owing To Opposition To Unit Rule--Edward Hanley Re-Elected Chairman Of State Central Committee Without Opposition--Presidential Electors Named

PLATFORM IS BRIEF

Toledo, O., June 5.—Governor Harmon's administration was warmly commended in the resolutions submitted by the committee on resolutions of the Democratic state convention.

The report pledges the Democratic party to revision of the tariff downward and condemned the Republican schedules enacted. The Ohio constitutional convention proposal No. 151, on the liquor license, and proposal No. 2, relating to the I. and R., were also indorsed in the resolution, as was the proposal for home rule for cities.

Mayor Baker of Cleveland submitted a minority report opposing the unit rule, although the majority report carries with it an indorsement of this rule, giving Governor Harmon the solid Ohio delegation of 48 votes in the Baltimore convention.

Toledo, O., June 5.—Delegates to the Democratic state convention again assembled at Terminal auditorium at 9:30 o'clock to continue their work of selecting the state ticket and naming delegates-at-large to the national convention. The convention was called to order by George E. Long, who had acted as the chairman of the temporary organization. The committee on permanent organization reported in favor of making the temporary organization permanent, which action was ratified by the convention.

Harmon men controlled the rules and order of business committee, of which Senator H. L. Yount was chairman. The committee reported in favor of the old rules that have heretofore obtained in Democratic conventions.

It was decided that the delegates present can announce the votes of counties, although it is contended that the law prohibits the voting of absent delegates.

After his contest had been rejected by the state central committee as being without foundation, Temporary Chairman George S. Long of Miami county was given half a vote in his delegation.

The credentials committee, controlled by Harmon men, compromised the fight in Miami county by giving five votes to the Harmon men and five to the anti-Harmon side, led by Henry Kampf of Lima. Both sides were ready to accept and the convention ratified. The decision adds five votes to the Harmon forces for the unit rule.

Both the state central committee and credentials committee rejected the contest of anti-Harmon men from Darke county.

Nye Lands His Man.

In the Tenth district Representative George B. Nye succeeded in naming one of his political associates, Judge C. P. Gableman of Pike county, as state central committee man. The result was effected by a combination of Jackson, Scioto, Galia and Pike counties, against Adams and Lawrence. The Adams and Lawrence men refused to play after the result. Gableman's opponent was State Printer E. A. Crawford, who had 14 votes to Gableman's 19. Crawford refused to go on the credentials committee after the defeat. Harmon men gained in getting Senator J. I. Hudson on the resolutions committee. Anti-Harmon men had the upper

hand in the Eighth district and elected followers of W. W. Durbin, in their respective balliwicks James Ross, Newton D. Baker and John A. O'Dwyer were supreme.



Toledo, O., June 5.—By agreement of all factions, State Chairman E. W. Hanley was re-elected by the new state central committee by acclamation. Vice Chairman John A. O'Dwyer of Toledo was re-elected unanimously, and J. W. Smith of Ottawa was elected secretary to succeed Joseph Harper, anti-Harmon man, who failed of re-election in the Seventh district. James Ross of Columbus presented J. A. Dodd of Pickaway county, a new member from the Seventh district, but withdrew his name before a ballot was completed. The governor's friends number at least 13 of the new committee and at least 12 in the resolutions committee.

INSECT PESTS OF WHEATFIELD

Information received by the Department of Entomology of the Ohio Experiment Station, and confirmed by observation in the Station's wheatfield, indicates that much of the wheat which survived the destructive cold and ice of the winter will succumb to destructive insects, Hessian fly, Chinch bug, ointworm and Midge all being in evidence. The work of these insects will be shown in the field at the annual wheatfield meeting, to be held at the Experiment Station on Friday afternoon, June 21, and in the evening their habits and the best known measures for their control will be discussed by the Station Entomologist in a lecture illustrated by stereopticon.
