REAL MENACE IN PANAMA CANAL SLIDES FACES UNCLE SAM'S DILIGENT DIGGERS



Panama, March 18—The menace of the Panama canal slides is growing. The situation is admitted to be serious. Colonel Goethals, in charge of the work, has been quoted as saying that the debris dumped into the big ditch at Culebra cut can be quickly removed, but despite this it is known that the slides are at present a serious problem to the canal diggers and may prove vital when the water is turned into the cut next fall. The



slide on the east bank of the Culebra cut, which first moved into the cut on the night of Feb. 5, has just made another rapid movement downward. It raised the bottom of the cut near the center for a distance of 1,000 feet to a vertical height of thirty feet, destroying five tracks and overturning two steam shovels. There is now only one construction track in operation. Altogether more than 2,000,000 cubic yards of earth and rock are in motion along the Panama canal, and the slides are showing more than usual activity. About Oct. 1 the water will be turned into the canal bed, for by that time it will have risen behind
