

MUNICIPAL LIGHT PLANT

For Mt. Vernon Received a Knock Out Blow

At City Council Meeting On Monday Evening

Two Members Vote Against The Resolution

Also Voted Down The Proposed Extension

Of The Water Works To "Grandview" Addition

The city council at the regular meeting Monday evening voted down a resolution introduced by Mr. Clifton which had for its purpose the question of submitting a proposition to the voters of Mt. Vernon at the regular election on Tuesday, November 4, to issue bonds in the sum of \$40,000 for the building and equipping a municipal electric light plant in the city of Mt. Vernon. Messrs. Dubinsky and Salisbury voted against the resolution and it was declared lost by the chair as it required a two-thirds vote to suspend the rules and read the resolution for the second time. Both Mr. Dubinsky and Mr. Salisbury explained their negative vote, stating that not sufficient information had been furnished relative to the cost of constructing and maintaining such a plant and that the people of Mt. Vernon should not be asked to vote on a proposition when they were so little informed on the subject.

All members of council were present. President pro tem Appleton was in the chair. Clerk Wootton read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved.

A resolution was presented approving the plans of the state board of health relative to the proposed sewage disposal plant for Mt. Vernon. This resolution was introduced at the last meeting of council, but the chair held that the proceedings in reference to the said resolution were irregular. At the last meeting the resolution was suspended and it was given a second and third reading and was adopted on final passage.

An ordinance was introduced having for its object the transfer of \$1,000 from a certain department to the contingent fund department in the water works department. It was the purpose to expend this money in extending the city water mains to "Grandview," the McConnell addition, east of the city. A motion was offered that the rules be suspended and the ordinance be given the second reading, but on the second reading Mr. Clifton and Mr. Dubinsky voted in the negative and the ordinance was declared defeated by the chair.

Mr. Clifton at this point offered a resolution that the city issue bonds in the sum of \$40,000 for the purpose of building a municipal electric light plant and that the question of the issuance of bonds be submitted to the voters at the regular November election. Mr. Weaver moved that the rules be suspended and the resolution be given its second reading. A lengthy discussion followed. Mr. Dubinsky was not satisfied with the cost of such a plant and stated that the first thing the people wanted to know is the real cost. Mr. Clifton presented figures regarding the cost of building and maintaining such a plant and said that electricity would cost the city about one-half the price than is now being paid. Mr. Salisbury was of the opinion of Mr. Dubinsky. The vote being put Messrs. Dubinsky and Salisbury voted in the negative and the resolution was declared lost by the chairman.

A resolution was introduced declaring it necessary to construct a sidewalk on the west side of Sandusky street from Hamtrack street to Hamilton avenue.

Upon motion both resolutions were referred to the street committee. Mr. Weaver offered a motion that

the city clerk notify the bondsmen of the former city clerk, Rollin R. McIntire, that they request him to return certain ordinances and other valuable papers belonging to the city which he has failed to turn over to the present clerk. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Higbee, residing in the west end of the city, was given permission to address council. He asked if the street commissioner had the authority to remove dirt from gutters in front of private dwellings and then sell the same for so much per load. He asked if the money for the dirt had been turned into the city funds. He was informed by Director of Service Blinn that no money for the sale of dirt had been turned in. Mr. Higbee gave the names of several persons who had purchased dirt. Mr. Clifton thought that the matter should be investigated at once and offered a motion that the chair appoint a committee of three to investigate the affair and to report at the next meeting of council. On this committee the president pro tem named Messrs. Farrison, Clifton and Weaver.

Mr. Cass, a resident of the east end of the city, was present and with a complaint. He stated that he had constructed a sidewalk in front of his property according to the orders of council, but that his neighbor, Chas. P. Patterson, had corn growing out on the place where the sidewalk ought to be. He asked council to investigate the matter at once.

Mr. Weaver offered a motion that the city engineer investigate the real water course on Sugar street. The motion prevailed.

Adjourned for two weeks.

NEW PLAN ADOPTED

By School Board Relative To Substitute Teachers

Young Lady; High School Students To Do The Work

New Manual Training Teacher Is Elected

Comes To The City From The Holgate Schools

High School Class Rooms In Central Building

A large number of the many matters that necessarily have to be taken care of at this time of the year were disposed of by the Mt. Vernon school board at an adjourned meeting held Monday evening. Messrs. George D. Arndt and Alfred Mill of the board were absent. The meeting was arranged for at the instance of Superintendent Zemer who had for his purpose the completing of the staffs of teachers in every grade. This was accomplished although one of the Superintendent's recommendations was not made but will be at the next meeting of the board.

A telegram was received by Mr. Zemer Monday evening from Mr. C. S. Martin at Bryan, Ohio, stating that the Bryan school board would not release him to the Mt. Vernon schools. The local board had been depending upon him to take charge of the manual training department because he was recommended at the last meeting by Mr. Zemer and had been elected on condition that he could secure his release.

Mr. Voigt of Holgate, Ohio, was recommended by the superintendent and was elected as manual training teacher at a salary of \$900 per year.

Miss Goldie Kunkel, formerly of the Fredericktown schools, was elected as a teacher in the sixth grade at a salary of \$500 per year.

Superintendent Zemer introduced a new idea relative to substitute teachers. He does not favor the plan of formally electing or appointing substitute teachers, but suggested that when substitutes are needed young ladies be selected out of the high school classes who aspire to become teachers and allow them to secure preliminary training in this way. They will be called upon to act as substitutes as long as the work does not become too heavy. This plan was adopted by the board.

Bids from various local firms on sundries and supplies for the city schools were received by the board and were read. They were submitted to President Lorey and Superintendent Zemer who were authorized to examine them to make the purchase of the needed supplies of the firms submitting the lowest bids.

Provisions were made to have the weeds on the vacant school lots in the west end mowed before they go to seed. This action was prompted by several complaints registered by persons residing in the vicinity of the above mentioned lots.

At last the difficult problem of preparing a suitable place for the instruction of the commercial classes of the high school has been solved. The partition between the two class rooms on the second floor and on the south side of the Central building will be torn out and the two rooms made into one large one. At one end of the large room a wooden partition, fitted with glass panels, will be erected allowing sufficient space to make a typewriting room of sufficient size. The glass panels will allow the teacher to oversee the students in each compartment at the same time and still allow those in the large room to escape from the clatter and noise of the typewriters. Twenty new desks will be purchased and will be placed in the commercial room.

Miss Marie Shireman was re-elected as high school librarian at a salary of \$150 per year.

The supply committee was instructed to purchase twelve chairs to be placed in the library.

DEATH

Comes To Brother Of Mrs. Barbara Carle Of This City

The Result Of An Accident In Columbus, Ohio

Peter Merkle, brother of Mrs. Barbara Carle of this city, died in Grant hospital, Columbus, Tuesday morning at 8:30 o'clock, the result of an accident which he sustained last Saturday.

The Columbus Journal of Tuesday morning gave the following account of the accident:

To surgeons at Grant Hospital the case of Peter Merkle, aged 70 years, presents a rare condition of injury. Mr. Merkle is in a serious condition as a result of a peculiar accident he suffered last Saturday night while trying to board a car at Oak street and Parsons Avenue. He was dragged about 50 feet, but succeeded in getting on the car. Immediately he began suffering abdominal pain and left the car at Grant Avenue and visited the office of Dr. H. W. Whitaker. After being moved to this home, Dr. T. W. Rankin was called in consultation.

Mr. Merkle did not respond to treatment and Dr. J. F. Baldwin was called as a surgical consultant yesterday. It was apparent to the physicians that Mr. Merkle was suffering from an abdominal calamity and an immediate surgical operation was deemed advisable.

On opening Mr. Merkle's abdomen at Grant Hospital, it was found that a hole had been torn in one of the intestines and that general peritonitis had developed. Mr. Merkle rallied nicely from the anesthetic. Owing to the extent of the abdominal inflammation and his advanced years, his recovery is not expected by the physicians, although all hope has not been abandoned.

Mr. Merkle is proprietor of the Union Depot restaurant and of lunch rooms in many cities.
