

# WENT ASLEEP IN HIS AUTO

### After Reckless Driving On North Main

### And Giving Scare To People Along Street

### Antics Of Drunken Driver Of Machine!

### South Vernon Disturbers Are Given Fine

### Worley Waives Examination And Bound Over

An automobile and a drunken driver gave the residents of North Main street quite a scare Tuesday evening and a call was sent for the police. Officer McElroy went to the scene in the automobile police patrol. He found a Mt. Vernon man badly overcome with booze sound asleep in his automobile. The man was loaded into the police patrol and taken before Mayor Perrine. By the time he reached the mayor's office he had sobered up to an extent and asked that no charge be filed against him. The mayor told the man that if he would go home and sober up and not attempt to drive his automobile and make a bed out of the machine when intoxicated no charge would be filed against him. The man agreed to this and started immediately for his home. His machine was put in a local garage by the police. Residents of North Main street stated to the police that the man was driving recklessly on the street and that finally he stopped the machine in front of a residence, stretched out on the back seat and went to sleep.

**Disturbers Fined**  
The three men who were raising a disturbance in South Vernon early Tuesday morning by attempting to lead a horse into a house, were arraigned before Mayor Perrine Tuesday evening. Each was charged with intoxication. The men first pleaded not guilty and when they found that they would be compelled to stay in jail until next Friday evening before a hearing they changed their plea to guilty and each drew a fine of \$5 and costs. One man settled and the other two made arrangements to pay in a week or so and were accordingly released.

**Waived Examination**  
H. Bunn Worley, merchant policeman, who was charged with assault, appeared before Mayor Perrine at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening and waived examination. He was bound over to the grand jury and bond was fixed at \$50. He gave surety for the amount and was released. Worley first entered a plea of not guilty and his hearing was set for Tuesday evening. It is alleged that Worley struck a

woman who was visiting in his home.

## UNIQUE Test Of Man's Strength Versus Fish

Columbus, O., Sept. 1—Is a man a stronger swimmer than a fish? A test of this interesting question is to be made at Buckeye Lake as a feature of the exercises in celebration of Labor Day. Not a single test, but several of them are to be made concurrently. The test is the result of a controversy that has been going on between fishermen and swimmers for some time. The sportsmen claim that no swimmer, however strong, when made fast to a line on five-ounce fly-rod, can resist successfully, the efforts of a skillful angler to bring him ashore.

Three expert swimmers, harnessed about the breast, and fastened to ordinary fly-rod lines, will plunge from the wharf, and after being given plenty of line by the anglers in charge of the rods, will be brought up and "played" just as the fisherman does the gamey fish to tire him—turning him and winding him by all the arts known to the craft. The human "fish" must keep in deep water, but may dive and resort to any plan of breaking the line that may depend on the same kind of efforts that a fish could make. To win the swimmers must break the lines, take the rods from the anglers' hands or pull them into the water. For the anglers to win they must eventually get the human "fish" near enough to the dock to touch them with either the landing net or the gaff.

The anglers are very confident, and claim that there never was a swimmer with a strike lusty enough to break a good line or rod in the hands of a skillful angler.
