

FAILURE TO INVENTORY

Corn And Fodder Results In Exceptions

Wherein Robinson Is Charged With Appropriation.

Of These Items By The Lawful Beneficiaries

Partition Of Monroe Township Property Is Sought

In the estate of Isaac F. Robinson exceptions to the appraisal and inventory have been filed by Mrs. Effie M. Bainhart, Mrs. Emma F. Phillips, Mrs. Ada M. Hauger, Mrs. Ella C. Scoles and William H. Robinson, through their attorneys, B. O. Evans and L. C. Stillwell. They claim that I. E. Robinson, executor, failed to inventory two fields of corn and 17 acres of fodder which amount in value to \$375. They say they have been informed that the executor has personally appropriated the corn and fodder.

George H. Ferenbaugh has brought an action for partition in which Grace E. Rawlinson, John E. Blocher and Harry C. Blocher, a guardian, are named as defendants.

The property in question is situated in Monroe township. Plaintiff states that he and defendants have interest in the property in the following proportions: 1-28 belongs to Grace E. Rawlinson and 1-28 to John E. Blocher.

Through his attorney, P. A. Berry, he asks for a partition.

PROSECUTOR
