Lewis D. Bonebrake

Lewis D. Bonebrake, for nine years superintendent of the Mt. Vernon public schools, died Tuesday morning at 6:20 o'clock at his home in Indianapolis, Ind., according to advices received by friends in this city.

It was only two weeks ago that the cause of Mr. Bonebrake's illness was ascertained when it was found that he was suffering from Bright's disease.

The deceased was about 56 years of age and is survived by one daughter, Marie, who resides in Indianapolis. The funeral Friday afternoon at Westerville where interment will also be made.

Prof. Bonebrake came to Mt. Vernon in the year of 1889 when he became superintendent of schools of this city. He served in that capacity for nine years and his efficiency attracted state-wide attention. In 1898, he resigned this position, a reward for merit having come in the shape of an appointment as state school commissioner.

Two terms were served by Prof. Bonebrake as a commissioner, after which he abandoned teaching for the time being and successfully engaged in the real estate business in Columbus for a number of years.

Lately, Prof. Bonebrake has been president of the Indiana Central university which is located in the suburbs of Indianapolis.

Washington, June 28—Representative C. C. POLYGAMY IS DENOUNCED

In Bitter, Anti-Mormon Address By Mrs. Shepard

SECT MERCILESSLY FLAYED

Their Habits And Creeds Scorched By Christian Glare—Hypocritical Liquor Stand Exposed By Speaker Who Proves Very Interesting To Audience

Polygamy and its every-day practices on the part of the Mormon sect were made the objects of a vituperative attack by Mrs. Lulu Loveland Shepard at the Baptist church Tuesday, while the cry necessity for some concerted and united action in stamping out this menace to Christianity and morality was forcefully portrayed by this unusual speaker, who delivered the address Tuesday night under the auspices of the ministerial association of the city and both branches of the W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Shepard, who spoke here several years ago and has a number of friends in this city, resides in the state of Utah and is the executive head of the W. C. T. U. organization in that state. She is now delivering addresses through the east under the direction of the National Reform association of Pittsburgh, Pa., which is making a wholesale fight against the extension of polygamy and Mormonistic principles.

The customs of the Mormons, their habits, creeds and viewpoints were mercilessly exposed by the speaker whose bitterness of tone betokened a too intimate knowledge of the hierarchy of polygamy in the state of Utah.

There was a large audience in attendance and every member thereof manifested an open interest and a keen appreciation of Mrs. Shepard's tirade and denunciations, together with the numerous revelations made by her.

Mrs. Shepard concentrated her attack on Mormonism's alliance with the liquor interests. "One after the other of the apostles, before the assemblage of 12,000 people at the state conference, denounced the liquor traffic and scolded the people for not electing prohibition legislators," said Mrs. Shepard in telling of the Utah liquor fight, "yet the facts are that the people twice elected a prohibition legislature, and both times the Mormon high priest governor vetoed the bill at the orders of the polygamist prophet, Joseph F. Smith, who claims the right to speak for God. "The Mormons control eleven Western states now, and should they get two more under their rule, the nation-wide prohibition bill will be killed, unless Joseph Smith rules otherwise," she added.

According to Mrs. Shepard, the power of the Mormons lies in their commercialism. "Every Mormon pays tithes," she said. "One-tenth of every man or woman's income, be it cash or produce, goes into the Lord's house, and is sold at whatever figure they are able to obtain. Mormons have \$27,000,000 in Wall street, and \$400,000,000 ready in Utah for use in emer-

gencies. They now control all the leading Western railroads, the best sugar industry and salt trusts, and numberless other trusts and enterprises. One-half million people listen to the dictations of the Mormon hierarchy and 5,000 missionaries are working in all parts of the world to spread the belief in the denomination," said Mrs. Shepard.

At the conclusion of the address subscription cards were distributed through the audience, and liberally signed. The money raised in this way goes to fight the Mormon religion and to finance a bill to wipe out polygamy, which is to be introduced into Congress next year.
